

Getting Home From Spain

In January 2020 we decided to escape the English winter and head off to Spain in our caravan for a few weeks with hopefully plenty of nice weather.

Our route was Portsmouth to Santander via Brittany Ferries which was routine as we had done this before.

Once in Spain we headed in a southerly direction as we wanted to go to the Cadiz area where we had never visited before.

One overnight stop en route and we arrived at our campsite and were directed to the pitch which was to ours for the month that we had organised.

Our first impressions of this site were that it was not what we had previously been used to in Spain on the Costa Blanca. This was not helped by the fact that on booking into reception we were asked to pay for our stay with cash which was unexpected and very unusual. We had sufficient cash with us but as we had budgeted for our three month stay expecting to be able to use our cards it put us on alert to not having to visit a bank to obtain further cash which is normally an expensive visit.

Anyway we made the best of our visit here with trips to Cadiz and Jerez both of which are lovely cities especially Cadiz which we were very taken with. It was in Cadiz that we found the city tour on a red double decker bus. Well worth the trip as we got to see all the interesting sites.

We left the Cadiz site at the end of our time and said goodbye to some friends who we knew from previous visits to Spain. As we were heading to the East coast of Spain, (Costa Blanca) to a campsite we had visited many times and enjoyed it immensely. We were also due to meet up with friends there who also enjoyed this site.

We had one overnight stay en route at another site we had visited situated in the Sierra Nevada mountains, again this visit was a lovely experience.

To shorten this tale all we can say is that we were enjoying our visit on our favourite site with our friends until we heard on the news of a problem in China with a serious virus there causing many deaths. This obviously concerned most people but thinking that is in China not Europe. (WRONG)

It was towards the end of our stay in Spain that things got serious as the virus was now affecting Madrid. Still a long way from where we were which caused some disquiet among the campers.

Things became serious for us at the beginning of March when the campsite imposed restrictions on visiting the supermarket and bars.

The Spanish Police then put restrictions of travel. We were only aloud off the site to visit a food shop, a pharmacy, or doctor. With very heavy penalties if you broke the rules.

Things got very serious around the week commencing 16th March when the campsite started asking people to leave very forcefully which was being backed up by the police.

We eventually had to leave on Saturday 21st March after discovering that our booked ferry from Bilbao had been cancelled which meant that our only option was to drive north out of Spain into France and head for the English Channel ports. To access France we had to obtain written authority to produce if we were stopped by their border officers or the police.

Our journey took three days of driving with overnight stops in lay-bys and service areas as no campsites were open.

We were very lucky to be accompanied by two other couples in a similar position to us and they followed behind us.

We were also fortunate to get a booking on the Euro Tunnel on Monday 23rd March at 6pm but on arrival there we were put on the next train at around 1pm and arrived in England about forty minutes later.

Out onto the M20 where we were very surprised to see that traffic was about as normal as a normal day. Bearing in mind that we had travelled hundreds of miles in Spain and France and only saw the occasional car, and some trucks. Obviously Spain and France were taking this virus very seriously.

We arrived back in Cockfield during the evening of 24th March, what a relief!!

Since the problem of getting home had occurred we had been in touch with BBC Radio Suffolk who were interested in our story and so they contacted us everyday during our journey home wanting information about our progress and what the situation was like in the countries we were travelling in.

Obviously we are now in Lockdown like everyone else but hey we are Brits so KEEP CALM, KEEP SAFE and CARRY ON.

VE Day Recollections

My very clear memory of VE Day was that the whole school went on a picnic - it was a lovely day, warm and sunny and there was a stream in the meadow and some of us paddled! We must have still been out in the fields as I have absolutely no recollection of Churchill's speech on the radio which was supposed to have happened at 3 in the afternoon - although I do clearly remember being called in from the garden to hear Chamberlain announce that we were now at war with Germany five years previously.

When I say 'the whole school' I should say that there were only about a dozen of us aged from about 4 to 11, including two small boys. My father had been posted to command RAF North Coates in January 1944 which was right out on the Humber estuary in Lincolnshire and, as it was still being used for active service, none of the aircrew were allowed to have their families there so there was no school and it was at least 12 miles from the nearest town which was Grimsby and with no petrol either I had to be sent to boarding school So, with about 3 weeks to arrange it my parents got me into a little PNEU* school in Rutland, where a friend's child already was. The school had been evacuated from Bexhill to Langham, just outside Oakham, where they had been 'lent' a large house for the duration, and it was run by two old (to me at the time) ladies. The only other grown-up was an RAF wife who did all the cooking and her two children were amongst the pupils: I always rather envied them for having their mother there but Timmy was only about 4! We children did all the housework, ran errands in the village, and helped cultivate an allotment as well as being reasonably well educated! Very good on the arts but not so much on the scientific side and, at one point, when my father did a long overseas trip,I his letters were used for geography lessons (and I never got them back which always rankled!). One of the things I remember more vividly perhaps than VE Day was that, the previous year we had all walked or bicycled to a nearby field where they must have been practising for the Arnhem landings. We saw all these aeroplanes dropping parachutes with soldiers landing and the King came up to see them too, which was all very exciting.

Cockfield United Football Club

Hello to you all from Cockfield United Football Club and we all hope that you are managing to stay safe and well in these turbulent times. Welcome to the first of what we hope will be a monthly update of the events within the club.

As this is our first report we would like to give a brief history of the Football Club for newer members of the village or for those who were maybe not aware. Cockfield has been represented by a football team since pre World War 2, according to local historians the site for the home ground had been moved around the village, with one site being on 'Clarence's' meadow at the junction of Howe Lane and Colchester Green Lane, before settling on Great Green. For many years we were members of Bury and District Football League until 1999 when we took a step up into the Suffolk and Ipswich League. This move was a good one and rapid progression saw us move through the leagues, even enjoying a brief stint in the Senior Division. During this time we were also successful in the Suffolk Cups coming out as Suffolk Junior Cup Winners in the 2002/03 season and making it to the Semi Final of the Senior Cup in 04/05. We have also had two stints of being represented by a Sunday side in the Bury and District League, again both stints were very fruitful in terms of silverware including the Suffolk Sunday Trophy in 2011/12. We have also recently started a Veterans side in the Norfolk and Suffolk League with many familiar local faces coming back to play for the club.

Back into the present and the 2019/20 season, a season that has been dominated more by events off the pitch than on it. For us the season started very positively with the news that we had been awarded Charter Standard Status by the FA (this is an accreditation to show a good standard of club administration and standards).

On the pitch the First Team in Division 2 were having a solid season sitting in 7th place, but with several games in hand on those ahead of them before the season was curtailed. The Reserves had been promoted into Intermediate A, the highest reserve league at this level, and ultimate found it a struggle to adapt to the higher level of football, although by the time season was curtailed we were starting to pick up results. The Veterans, although not playing many games, had a good season and had made it to two cup semi finals when the season was halted.

Looking forward to next season we will be running four teams for the First time in our history when the Sunday side restart, so if there is anyone interested in joining the club, in either a playing or other capacity please don't hesitate to contact us. Cockfield Parish Council Notes

Summary report of the Ordinary
Parish Council meeting held on 25th June 2020

The Parish Council held another successful online virtual meeting via Skype

Outstanding Actions were noted from previous meetings:

Pavilion Agreement: Cllr Webster, to draft a letter for Cllr Southgate to sign on behalf of the Parish Council, acknowledging the Football Club's letter.

Telephone Kiosk: Cllr Brinkley to investigate the feasibility and cost of resting the Parish Council owned telephone kiosk from outside the Post Office to the corner of the Great Green.

Parking at Great Green: Cllr Brinkley confirmed he had sourced 3.5 telegraph poles to create a physical boundary around the three-car parking bay at the corner of Great Green.

Mackenzie Place Bus Shelter: quotations to be sought from a local contractor to refurbish the Bus Shelter.

New Adventure Playground: Action Play & Leisure to be contacted to establish their work status following lockdown in order to progress the project. **Refurbishment of Bandstand:** Refurbishment of the bandstand has been completed. **Action Closed**

Gate at Earls Meadow: Cllr Williams has raised safety concerns with John Warne over the condition of sleeper bridge. John Warne confirmed that there was no Public Right of Way over the bridge or across his land, however he was happy to allow continued public access, but won't repair the bridge as it is a SCC asset. The Clerk to draft Safety Warning Notices to be placed either side of the bridge.

Hedge Trimming in Howe Lane adjacent to ex-Railway Bridge & Pavilion Flag Pole:

The Parish Council would like to extend its thanks to Phillip Bowcher (David Hodge Farms) for his assistance in trimming the hedge and fixing the flagpole. **Action Complete.**

Public Participation Session: County Cllr Lindsay circulated his report prior to the meeting, but highlighted the Suffolk County Council cycling initiative to prioritise a list of costed cycle routes around the County and for Highways to engage with District Councils to develop a 5-year rolling plan for cycling.

Cllr Morley highlighted the need for SCC to cut the verges on all the designated cycling routes throughout the village to reduce the safety risk to cyclists. SC Cllr Lindsay agreed to pursue this issue with Highways on behalf of the Parish Council.



District Cllr Maybury circulated her report prior to the meeting, but highlighted the restrictions imposed by BMSDC on bonfires.

Cllr Maybury offered to provide details of these restrictions to Cllr Cutting-Keyton to publish in Green Links and on the village website.

District Cllr Arthey advised that BMSDC had paid out 90% of the available funding for Business Support Grants, but majority of the Discretionary Grants funding is still available to applicants. Leisure centres should open at approximately 30% capacity from July.

CCTV coverage was being upgraded in Hadleigh and Sudbury and parking restrictions had been put in place to support social distancing.

Risk Register: The updated / amended risk register was adopted.

Finance: It was agreed to accept the quotation to manufacture a new Oak, Glazed, Lockable Notice Board and support posts to replace the old notice board in the existing location at the Great Green. It was agreed that a Cordless Sander be purchased for use on Parish Council Assets.

Pavilion Update: Investigative and monitoring visits by 3no contractor have continued in order to inform the remediation works.

Future Meeting Structure: It was agreed to implement a revised meeting Agenda structure.

PARISH COUNCIL

Maintenance Calendar: the 5-Year Maintenance Calendar was adopted and to be reviewed every 4 months and updated annually.

Local Housing Needs: District Cllr Arthey explained the respective benefits of a Housing Survey and an adopted Neighbourhood Plan.

Following much discussion on a possible survey format Cllrs agreed to form a working group headed by Cllr Southgate, Cllrs Cutting-Keyton, Morley and Turner volunteered to join the group.

District Cllr Arthey recommended that the Parish Council should consult Paul Bryant (BMSDC Neighbourhood Plan representative) for advice on timescales, stages, costs and help that would be available to produce a Neighbourhood Plan. Although Cllrs decided not to pursue the development of a Neighbourhood Plan at this point in time.

Parish Councillor Vacancy: Councillors agreed to attempt to seek interest from the village and fill the existing vacancy on the council. Advertisements would feature in Green Links and the website.

Earl's Meadow: Cllr Williams expressed his thanks to the extensive efforts of volunteers to refurbish benches in Earls Meadow, Bruffs Line and Jeffreys Green although 3no further tins of preservative were required to complete the picnic tables and benches in Earls Meadow.

Cemetery:_Cllr Turner requested that an advert be placed in Green Links for Working Party volunteers to undertake work on the unattended graves in the Cemetery as these need tidying up.

Parish Paths: Cllr Webster confirmed that he had reported damage to the bridge near the 'Stone', to SCC. Cllr Brinkley confirmed that he had spoken to Phillip Bowcher, who had agreed to cut the verges along the footpaths in Howe Lane between the War Memorial and Maltravers (next to the Post Office) and between Dorling Cottage and Clovell

Police: Cllr Cutting-Keyton advised that the police were operating speed checks in the area.

Play Equipment: The Parish Council concluded that at this time we are not able to reopen the Children's playground because of Covid-19 restrictions and guidance.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING ARRANGEMENTS UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.

In line with Government advice, the Parish Council are no longer holding physical Ordinary or Extraordinary Parish Council meetings, in public at the Village Hall. The Parish Council meetings at the Village Hall scheduled for the 30th July have therefore been cancelled and will instead be held via Skype Video Conferencing. Details of how to Access the meetings can be found on the Village web site. A decision relating to Parish Council Meetings beyond 30 July, will be taken nearer the time.

Cockfield Parish Council Vacancy for one councillor

The Parish Council as seeking to co-opt an additional member to the Councillor. This is subsequent to the position not being fulfilled through the electoral process. Previous efforts in filling this position have unfortunately be unsuccessful and we are again reaching out to the village.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

Parish Councillors are elected representatives who volunteer their time freely to work on behalf of local residents. Individuals may also be coopted at the discretion of the council if there is a vacancy. By becoming a parish councillor you can become a voice for your community, somebody who residents will look to for help, guidance and support. You will be involved in local decision making and strategic planning for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

What are the roles and responsibilities involved?

A Cockfield Parish Councillor is one of 9 individuals, supported by the Parish Clerk, who are elected to represent the voice of residents within the village. This will involve engaging with local residents to ensure that their views are heard, understood and addressed.

As part of the Parish Council you will have responsibility for managing local services and amenities such as the play areas, Greens, amenity land, bus shelters, cemetery and other Parish assets.

As part of the Parish Council you will help to make decisions regarding the finances involved in delivering local services. You will be involved in working to protect and improve the built and natural environment of Cockfield. This may involve contributing to long

term policy development or being part of the team that assesses and comments on local planning applications. Working where needed on short term local projects.

Liaising and working in partnership with other organisations, agencies or neighbouring parish councils where necessary.

What skills will I need to be a Parish Councillor?

A Council Committee benefits from diversity and we welcome interest from people of different ages, backgrounds, experiences and, abilities both practical and administrative. Good communication skills, problem solving, analytical thinking and being a team player are all advantageous attributes.

How much time does being a councillor take?

As with anything, what you get out of being a Parish Councillor will depend on what you are able to put in. How much time you are able to commit is largely down to the individual and what level of involvement you are hoping for. As a minimum, you would be expected to attend the monthly Parish Council meetings held one evening per month. In addition, you will need to be free to attend the meetings of any working groups for example Greens Management, Planning consultation, CIL Projects

How long does a Parish Councillor serve for?

Once elected, Parish Councillors can sit on the Parish Council for a maximum of 4 years. If after that time, you wish to stay in post then you will need to stand for re-election.

The best way to discover if being a Cockfield Parish Councillor is right for you, is to come along to one of our meetings (Currently via Skype), meet the team and see us in action. Alternatively in the first instance feel free to contact the Parish Clerk and have an initial discussion.








Gardening Tips for August 2020

Flowers and Herbs


- I find that if you add a layer of horticultural grit or fine gravel to tubs and pots that this not only helps to retain moisture but also reduces weeds.
- Keep on top of deadheading to prolong perennial flowering season.
- Hardy Perennial geraniums such as 'Johnson's Blue' have finished blooming now, so cut them right to the ground and water to encourage them to put up a second flush of foliage as soon as possible.

Once it has finished flowering trim back your lavender (avoid cutting into old wood) this will keep the plant

in good shape.

 Stake/support late-flowering perennials such as Asters, Echinacea and Rudbeckias.

- Cut back both bronze and greenleaved fennel. If left it will self- seed and soon take over.
- Sweet peas If you don't want the house full of pollen beetle then place your vase of freshly picked Sweet Peas in a dark place for a few hours before bringing inside.



greenhouse. Once completely dried extract the seed by placing in a paper bag and shaking. Then decant the seed into paper envelopes and label accordingly.

- Plant autumn bulbs such as Colchicums and Nerines. Plant up pots of Paper White narcissus bulbs for a lovely indoor display at Christmas.
- Cut back herbs now to encourage a flush of new leaves before the frosts arrive.



Fruit and Vegetables

- Plant out your leeks and brassicas if you haven't already. You can also sow spinach and Chard in the first 2 weeks of August.
- Harvest sweetcorn and other vegetables such as aubergine, cucumbers, 2nd earlies, & main crop potatoes.



- Continue to feed tomato plants with tomato fertiliser. Remove lower leaves to increase air flow. Pinch out the top of tomato plants to concentrate the growth back into the fruit that has already formed.
- Water tomatoes frequently, morning and evening to prevent blossom end rot. This appears as brown or black spot on the fruit and grows in

size and gradually becomes sunken and flat.

- Support plum trees. Make sure that particularly heavy-cropping varieties, such as 'Victoria', are firmly tied in to stakes. Support heavy branches with cleft sticks – when heavy with fruit, branches can snap.
- Check early apple varieties such as 'Discovery' and 'Katy'. Lift the fruit gently and if it comes off in your hand, these are ready to eat.



- Tidy up strawberry plants and remove any old straw from around the plants to increase air flow. This will help reduce the risk of pests and diseases.
- Summer fruiting raspberries Cut back the fruited canes leaving the new green canes for next year's crop. Don't forget to tie in to supports.

Trees, Shrubs and Climbers

- Prune rambling roses by removing one third of the stems which have flowered and then tie the remaining stems in to their supports.
- Remove suckers from roses and also from around the base of trees.
- Cut laurel hedges with secateurs rather than a hedge trimmer to avoid torn leaves which will turn brown and unsightly.
- Water camellias and rhododendrons thoroughly with rainwater this month to make sure next year's buds flower well.

Lawns

- Tackle stubborn lawn weeds by digging them out or using a proprietary lawn weedkiller.
- Keep an eye on newly turfed lawns and ensure you water regularly during dry periods.
- Lawn growth tends to slow down in late summer so it's a good idea to raise the cutting height on your lawn mower



General Maintenance and Planning

- Before they can get established clear weeds from paving, gravel paths and driveways by hand or by applying a proprietary weedkiller. Alternatively, use boiling water on paved areas and the weeds should wilt and die away within a few days.
- Give hedges a final trim before growth slows.
- In the greenhouse tidy up any dead leaves and flowers to reduce pests and diseases.
- If you're going away ask a neighbour or willing family member to pick your flowers, salad and veg to prevent everything running to seed in your absence.
- Take a note of how your borders are looking. I take photos of my garden every month so that I can refer back. This helps to check whether there are any gaps or congested areas? Also you can tell whether your plants are thriving in their current positions? Make a note of any proposed changes /additions to be actioned this autumn or next spring.

Update to Windows 10 May 2020 Update

A couple of months ago I wrote about the forthcoming major update to Windows, the May 2020 update, the first of 2 major Windows releases each year. That update has started its rollout and this is still going on.

To prepare for the update, first check that you are currently on the

latest version of Windows.

In the left sidebar, scroll down and click the final setting, Info.



If the Windows version is less than 1909 check the Updates & Security setting to see if an optional update is available. Close the System window, then go back to Start and Settings, then click the last item, Update & Security.

In the screenshot below, although the headline shows the system is up to date, further down it shows that the Optional feature update, 1909, is available. Click the 'download and install now' link to update the system then follow the instructions.



You can now check for and install the May 2020 update. If it is available for installation as described above, once you have competed the update the Windows version check should show Version 2004.

Last time I said that the release will include a change to the menu system. In fact that is not the case and it's now being predicted to be included with the May 2021 update. This current update includes no game changing features. Per-

This current update includes no game changing features. Perhaps most useful will be the ability to carry a full system recovery of Windows from the cloud.

Dear Friends,

We are, of course, all human, and we often fail to be as loving to each other as we could be, but we know that God forgives us, God always forgives us. We can start afresh every week once we have said sorry to God and to each other.

The Church is not just a building. The Church is the people that join together in a community that worships, learns and has fun together. All are welcome to come along, no qualifications necessary!

Given the current situation with many people in 'lockdown' in their homes due to the Coronavirus outbreak, we would not recommend having a bonfire as it is likely to cause more of an annoyance than usual, or breathing difficulties for neighbours who may be suffering with respiratory issues related to the illness. We would advise you to compost waste wherever possible, or to store it on your property ready for when the waste collection and recycling facilities are able to resume normal operation.

If you must have a bonfire we would ask you to be considerate of others at this time and would suggest that you inform your neighbours of when you intend to burn – post a note through their letterbox if necessary. This will enable them to make the necessary arrangements to protect themselves, for example, closing windows and removing washing from outside. By doing this you will significantly reduce the likelihood of complaints to the Council.

There are no specific controls, such as permitted times, over the lighting of bonfires to burn waste. If only dry waste is burnt the occasional bonfire should not cause a problem.

If the bonfires are only occasional it will be difficult to prove a nuisance in law. This would also apply if there are several different neighbours occasionally having bonfires. For further information on the law a Garden Bonfires Leaflet is available to download via the Babergh website

If you are being disturbed by bonfire smoke from your neighbour, it is worth talking to them about it in the first instance – they may not realise they are causing a problem.

If you have spoken to your neighbour and the situation doesn't improve, report it to us providing evidence about the frequency of the bonfires, their duration, location and how the problem directly affects you.

Bonfire guidelines

If you must have a bonfire follow these guidelines to avoid causing a nuisance and to keep safe:

- Keep the number of bonfires to an absolute minimum.
- Only burn dry material. This will produce the minimum of smoke.
- Never burn household rubbish, rubber tyres, or anything containing plastic, foam or paint. The Council will collect domestic hazardous waste for a small fee - see our Hazardous Waste Collections page for details.
- Never use old engine oil, methylated spirit or petrol to light or encourage the fire.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions. Smoke hangs in the air on damp, still days and in the evening around sunset – ensure the bonfire is extinguished well be fore.
- If it is windy, smoke may be blown into neighbours' gardens and across roads.
- Keep the bonfire under adult supervision at all times and ensure it is extinguished completely, by dousing with soil or water, before you leave it.
- Keep a hose pipe or buckets of water close at hand in case the fire gets out of hand.
- Take account of your neighbours' activities e.g. washing hanging on a line, open windows, sitting in garden, decorating etc.
- Consult, or at least warn, your neighbour before lighting a bonfire.



Congregational Church Corner

When Phillipe Auguste, king of France, came with his army to face an enemy on the battle-field, he called into his tent his trusted knights and placed on a table before them a golden crown on which was etched: "To the most worthy" which, he told them, would be awarded to the bravest fighter in the battle before them that day. After the battle the king and his knights filed back into the king's tent and reassembled around the table on which the crown was placed but before the king could say anything one of his knights picked up the crown, as if to claim it for himself, but instead of doing so he immediately placed it on the head of his king and said: "Oh king, you are the most worthy and entitled to wear this crown."

This event, although taking place centuries ago, reminds us of a future event when a crown will be placed on the head of the Lord Jesus Christ and at that time "Every knee will bow to Him and every tongue confess that He is Lord of all" (2 Philippians: 10 &11). On this occasion there will not be just a few knights to witness the event but that this event will be attended by everyone on earth, consisting of many, many millions of people, all of whom will confess His lordship. For those who know and love Him already as lord and Saviour of their lives this will be a great and glorious day to see their king being proclaimed as the one who has gained the victory of sin and the consequences of it (Romans 6:23).

Thomas Kelly, the hymn writer, may have had a vision of this event taking place when he wrote: "Look, ye saints the sight is glorious, see the Man of sorrows now; from the fight returned victorious; every knee to Him shall bow; crown Him, crown Him, crown Him, crown Him; crowns become the victor's brow."

How true those words are, because when Jesus was crucified, the Roman soldiers platted a crown of thorns and pressed this onto His head as an act of derision and made mock obeisance to Him. He was then the man of sorrows but, on the glorious day when Jesus will receive His rightful crown this will not be composed of thorns but it will be made of pure gold to signify that He is lord of lords and king of kings (1Timothy 6:15) and He will then be acknowledged as the most worthy.
