This half term we have managed to enjoy some trips and special weeks-On the 29th June Oak class went to Banham zoo to find out more about African animals. We had a fantastic day and saw lots of animals really close up. Here are some of the things we have learned:

I learned that giraffes have unique patterns – Ralph

I learned that tigers are endangered - Faith

I learned that macaws fly above the forest and they fly in pairs - Henry I liked seeing the vultures because I've never seen a real one before - Blake. I learned that it is really hard to see sea lions when they are underwater. This makes it hard for their predators to see them too - Alexia.

Birch also went to Banham Zoo as part of their science research on evolution and inheritance. Their understanding of how animals have evolved and adapted has been impressive.

As part of their Roman topic, Willow visited Colchester Castle. As well as exploring the artefacts in the museum, they also had the chance to build a replica Roman villa and Celtic roundhouse. The class also met John who took them down into the dungeons to hear stories about the Roman army and what they did to the Celtics as well as Boudicca's rebellion.

"We thought building the roundhouse was hard because it was difficult to weave the slats in and out." RJ and Ella.

"I liked pretending to be a Roman soldier while John told the stories." Jemma As part of our science and environment week, we returned to Bradfield Woods this summer. Lime & Oak Class went on a sensory journey, exploring the woodland, discovering nature through sensory activities, identifying and naming trees and invertebrates. This inspired them when making art and sharing stories. Birch and Willow investigated how to live more sustainably and how to look after the natural environment. Two fantastic days provided by the Suffolk Wildlife Trust.

Garden Tips for August 2021


Flowers and Herbs

Watch out for the dreaded scarlet lily beetles. Remove and dispatch any you see. Also check the underside of leaves for the sticky brown larvae

and remove.



- Keep on top of deadheading to prolong perennial flowering season.
- Hardy Perennial geraniums such as 'Johnson's Blue' have finished blooming now, so cut them right to the ground and water to encourage them to put up a second flush of foliage as soon as possible.
- Once it has finished flowering trim back your lavender (avoid cutting into old wood) this will keep the plant in good shape.
- Stake/support late-flowering perennials such as Asters, Echinacea and Rudbeckias.
- Cut back both bronze and green-leaved fennel. If left it will self- seed and soon take over.
- Sweet peas If you don't want the house full of pollen beetle then place your vase of freshly picked Sweet Peas in a dark place for a few hours before bringing inside.
- Collect ripe seed heads on a dry day from plants such as Opium Poppies (grey leaved) and other flowers such as Aquilegia and Nigella (Love-in-the -mist) I am currently drying out my Opium poppy heads in my greenhouse. Once completely dried extract the seed by placing in a paper bag and shaking. Then decant the seed into paper envelopes and label accordingly.
- Plant autumn bulbs such as Colchicums and Nerines. Plant up pots of Paper White narcissus bulbs for a lovely indoor display at Christmas.
- Cut back herbs now to encourage a flush of new leaves before the frosts arrive.



Fruit and Vegetable

- Plant out your leeks and brassicas if you haven't already. You can also sow spinach and Chard in the first 2 weeks of August.
- Harvest sweetcorn and other vegetables such as aubergine, cucumbers, 2nd earlies, & main crop potatoes.
- Continue to feed tomato plants with tomato fertiliser. Remove lower leaves to increase air flow. Pinch out the top of tomato plants to concentrate the growth back into the fruit that has already formed.
- Water tomatoes frequently, morning and evening to prevent blossom end rot. This appears as brown or black spot on the fruit and grows in size and gradually becomes sunken and flat.
- Support plum trees. Make sure that particularly heavy-cropping varieties, such as 'Victoria', are firmly tied in to stakes. Support heavy branches with cleft sticks when heavy with fruit, branches can snap.
- Check early apple varieties such as 'Discovery' and 'Katy'. Lift the fruit gently and if it comes off in your hand, these are ready to eat.
- Tidy up strawberry plants and remove any old straw from around the plants to increase air flow. This will help reduce the risk of pests and diseases.
- Summer fruiting raspberries Cut back the fruited canes leaving the new green canes for next year's crop. Don't forget to tie in to supports.

Trees, Shrubs and Climbers

- Prune rambling roses by removing one third of the stems which have flowered and then tie the remaining stems in to their supports.
- Remove suckers from roses and also from around the base of trees.
- Cut laurel hedges with secateurs rather than a hedge trimmer to avoid torn leaves which will turn brown and unsightly.
- Water camellias and rhododendrons thoroughly with rainwater this month to make sure next year's buds flower well.
- Look out for symptoms of 'clematis wilt' –
 This will be evidenced by black discolouration on leaves and stems. Cut out all infected material and dispose of in household waste.



Lawns

- Tackle stubborn lawn weeds by digging them out or using a proprietary lawn weedkiller.
- If your lawn is infested by ants, brush out the nests on a dry day. Always do this before mowing.
- Lawn growth tends to slow down in late summer so it's a good idea to raise the cutting height on your lawn mower.

General Maintenance and Planning

- Turn the compost in your compost bins every month to keep it aerated and speed up the decomposition process.
- Give hedges a final trim before growth slows.
- Remove any excess rampant plants (Irises and bulrushes) from ponds before they have time to go to seed and takeover.




- In the greenhouse tidy up any dead leaves and flowers to reduce pests and diseases.
- If you're going away ask a neighbour or willing family member to pick your flowers, salad and veg to prevent everything running to seed in your absence.
- Take a note of how your borders are looking. I take photos of my garden every month so that I can refer back. This helps to check whether there are any gaps or congested areas? Also you can tell whether your plants are thriving in their current positions? Make a note of any proposed changes /additions to be actioned this autumn or next spring.

Summary report of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council on 24 June 2021 at 7.30pm held in the Village Hall, Cockfield.

Ongoing actions;

Telephone Kiosk; Given the difficulties with relocating the telephone box Cllr Turner would investigate alternative solutions to house a defibrillator at Great Green.

Turfing at Great Green Play Equipment: Cllrs were reminded that this work had been deferred until the Autumn.

Planning Compliance; The Clerk noted the remedial work undertaken by SCC on the overgrown hedge problems at Craufard House, Howe Lane. However, overgrown hedge at Meadow Lodge, Chapel Rd had not yet been actioned.

The Clerk to contact BMSDC Enforcement to ascertain whether the work undertaken to create the visibility splays to the entrance to the site (DC/18/00306) is the full extent of work to be undertaken, or whether the contractor intends removing tree stumps etc. It seems there is no obligation under the approval to completely remove tree stumps etc. Cllrs are therefore concerned as to the long -term maintenance provision the developer has for this. Situation to be monitored.

Dog Litter Bin (Smithwood Green) This had been procured and work to site the bin with a metal post is in hand with local contractors.

Bandstand; Cllr Morley to obtain a quotation for cleaning and painting the inside and the outside of the Bandstand, Great Green.

Litter Pick; Cllrs were reminded that the Litter Pick along the A1141 between Loft Corner and the southern Cockfield Boundary is deferred until the Autumn.

Glebe Land; Cllrs Webster and Morley had visited the glebe land to review the main entrance visibility improvements, gates and security, other short-term maintenance issues and vegetation trimming.

Suffolk County Councillor had a clash of meeting so only provided a written report and Babergh District Councillor Reports gave updates from across the district.

Public comment; Members of the Public reiterated concerns for overgrown footways and hedges.

Planning: Applications received which have been referred to the Parish Council for consultation;

DC/21/03129: Householder Planning Application - Erection of a first-floor extension over existing single storey side extension and replacement of existing conservatory with single storey rear extension. Jaydam House, 8 Great Green, Cockfield, Suffolk IP30 OHQ (Consultation Response Deadline 18/06/21, extended until 28/06/21). The Parish Council Supported this application

DC/21/02296: Submission of details (Reserved Matters) under Outline Planning Permission DC/19/04755 dated 22/02/2021. Appearance, Landscaping, Layout and Scale for Erection of up to 28no. dwellings (Plots 5, 6 and 7 of Reserved Matters Permission DC/19/02020 to be repositioned/amended). Discharge of Conditions 5 (Archaeological Work), 8 (Estate Roads and Footpaths), 10 (Parking), 11 (Refuse Bins), 12 (Construction Management Plan), 13 (Construction Environmental Management Plan), 14 (Biodiversity Enhancement Strategy), 15 (Landscape Environmental Management Plan), 19 (Surface Water Drainage Scheme), 26 (Swift Boxes), 27 (Hedgehog Fencing), 28 (Rainwater Harvesting), 29 (Electric Car Charging Points) and 30 (Tree Survey). Land To The Rear Of Plough And Fleece Inn, Great Green, Cockfield, Suffolk (Consultation Response Deadline 22/06/21, extended until 28/06/21). The Parish Council objected to the application (Full detail of the extensive response can be found on the BMSDC Planning portal)

DC/21/03177: Notification for works to trees in a Conservation Area - Remove approximately 14no Conifer trees (Forming Hedge) and Replant with Laurel. Candleford House, Cross Green, Cockfield, Bury St Edmunds Suffolk IP30 OLG (Consultation Response Deadline 24/06/21, extended until 28/06/21). The Council had not objection

DC/21/03496: Proposal: Application for works to a tree/s in a Conservation Area - Prune back 1No Acacia tree (T1) large branch overhanging the patio to an appropriate growing point. Prune back 1No Acacia tree (T2), overhanging branch over the garage to an appropriate growing point. Removing any dead branches on both trees. Sketch plan 1. Hope House, Cross Green, Cockfield, Suffolk IP30 OLG (Consultation Response Deadline 09/07/21). The Council had not objection

Babergh District Council planning permissions/refusals received:

DC/21/002586: Notification of Works to Trees Protected by a Preservation Order - T1 (Sycamore) - Remove basal epicormic growth. T2 (Oak) - Raise crown to 5m; reduce lateral extension to west by 2m to suitable growth points; remove deadwood and snapped branches. G1 (Sycamores) - Reduce lateral extension to north by 1-2m to suitable growth points. Parcel Of Land North of Wood End House. **Decision: Consent has been Granted.**

Cllrs noted they had received no formal update on the on-going Loft Croner development.

Council discussed the previous committee meeting with contribution from Cllr Arthey on the process and how other councils dealt with such situations. The Council are awaiting an update to discuss this further

Finance:

Under our financial regulations we agreed; a donation gift for Mr L Mills as a 'Thank You' for undertaking the Internal Audit. A further donation gift for Mrs G Rose as a 'Thank You' for maintaining the War Memorial grass and flower bed.

Governance; To meet our statutory obligation we reviewed procedures; To confirm systems of internal control & take action as appropriate and in compliance with the Accounts & Audit Regulations 2015, to further approve the completion of Section 1 of the Annual Return – "Annual Governance Statement 2020/21" for Cockfield Parish Council. From this to approve Section 2 of the Annual Return – "Accounting Statements 2020/21" for Cockfield Parish Council.

Suffolk County Council School Bus Service; Cllrs noted Cllr Lindsay's contact with the new SCC Portfolio holder and correspondence shared on the matter. Whilst there is more clarity on the demarcation and overall school catchment vs transport strategy, the situation remains with greater impact on Cockfield than first thought. The Chairman will further correspond with SCC using this

information and earlier research.

Neighbourhood CIL (Bus Shelter at Mackenzie Place); Cllr Morley indicated that he was in dialogue with Orwell Housing and the Contractor SEH French on how they could assist in this project.

Village Minibus; The was no update on this item.

Parking at Great Green; Cllrs had met with the Rpii Playground Safety Inspector to review safety measures around the play equipment and increased vehicle activity. The Parish Council Risk Schedule shows risk and mitigation. The inspector saw no inherent safety issues although he has suggested additional practicable measures that could be put in place. Cllrs are looking at these items and how they could be implemented.

Pavilion Update; The Contractor was progressing remediation works and is broadly on schedule. When this work is completed Cllr Golding will progress the kitchen floor and upgrades.

The Clerk noted he was still awaiting two further quotations for maintenance works to the railings.

Parish Councillor Vacancy:

The Chairman would include in his summary Green Links report details of the vacancy to be filled. Along side provision on the web site.

Maintenance Schedule and Asset Management;

Cllr Levit had circulated the Asset Register in advance. Cllrs noted there are some residual actions on asset inspections to close out.

Earls Meadow; The contractor was progressing the bridge remediation works.

Third Party Liaison;

Highways and Emergencies – Issues surrounding overgrown hedges and vegetation encroaching on the footways continues to be a massive problem. SSC Highways have no transparency on if / when action is going to be taken given how behind they are on the annual cutting programme. Cllr Lindsey would be asked to leverage the matters and escalate to the new portfolio holder, Paul West, to secure some urgent commitment for the A1141 and Perrydown Lane.

Police/Fire - Cllr Cutting-Keyton was chasing the crime reduction officer report.

Correspondence; Information concerning the Queens Platinum Jubilee in 2022 had been received. Cllrs will consider any events to mark this occasion in due course.

<u>Cockfield Parish Council – Vacancy for one councillor</u>

Some of you may be aware that a long-standing Councillor Rodney Williams decided to "retire" after 14 years of service on the Parish Council.

Therefore, the Parish Council are seeking to co-opt an additional member to the Councillor, and we are again reaching out to the village.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

Parish Councillors are elected representatives who volunteer their time freely to work on behalf of local residents. Individuals may also be co-opted at the discretion of the council if there is a vacancy. By becoming a parish councillor you can become a voice for your community, somebody who residents will look to for help, guidance and support. You will be involved in local decision making and strategic planning for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

What are the roles and responsibilities involved?

- A Cockfield Parish Councillor is one of 9 individuals, supported by the Parish Clerk, who are elected to represent the voice of residents within the village. This will involve engaging with local residents to ensure that their views are heard, understood and addressed.
- As part of the Parish Council you will have responsibility for managing local services and amenities such as the play areas, Greens, amenity land, bus shelters, cemetery and other Parish assets.
- As part of the Parish Council you will help to make decisions regarding the finances involved in delivering local services.

You will be involved in working to protect and improve the built and natural environment of Cockfield. This may involve contributing to long term policy development or being part of the team that assesses and comments on local planning applications.

Working where needed on short term local projects.

Liaising and working in partnership with other organisations, agencies or neighbouring parish councils where necessary.

What skills will I need to be a Parish Councillor?

A Council Committee benefits from diversity and we welcome interest from people of different ages, backgrounds, experiences, abilities both practical and administrative. Good communication skills, problem solving, analytical thinking and being a team player are all advantageous attributes.

How much time does being a councillor take?

As with anything, what you get out of being a Parish Councillor will depend on what you are able to put in. How much time you are able to commit is largely down to the individual and what level of involvement you are hoping for. As a minimum, you would be expected to attend the monthly Parish Council meetings held one evening per month (Except August and December) In addition you will need to be free to attend the meetings of any working for example Greens Management, Planning consultation, CIL Projects

How long does a Parish Councillor serve for?

Once elected, Parish Councillors can sit on the Parish Council for a maximum of 4 years. If after that time, you wish to stay in post then you will need to stand for re-election.

The best way to discover if being a Cockfield Parish Councillor is right for you, is to come along to one of our meetings, meet the team and see us in action. Alternatively in the first instance feel free to contact the Parish Clerk and have an initial discussion.

COCKFIELD EMERGENCY PLAN

Update and appeal for volunteers

The Parish Council has recently been updating the Cockfield Emergency Plan in liaison with the Suffolk County Council Emergency Planning Officer. Like many towns and villages in Suffolk we have an Emergency Plan to help the community respond as effectively as possible to certain risk events, (particularly those where there is an actual or threatened injury or loss of life, or damage to property), in ways that complement and support the emergency services

Generally emergencies are managed and controlled by the Police and/or Fire Service or the Local Authorities, but there may be rare occasions when these services are not able to provide an immediate response, such as a national or county-wide extreme weather event, eg the October 1987 'hurricane'. On these occasions and at other times when risk events are very local, 'self help' action might be required and it is therefore important that the village is prepared by having an effective and up-to date Emergency Plan.

Risk events included in the plan are: extreme weather (snowfall, gales, heat-wave), flooding, prolonged loss of electricity supply, field fires, a major traffic incident and another pandemic. For each type of event, mitigation and response actions are included to manage the impacts that might be experienced, particularly by vulnerable, elderly and geographically isolated residents.

Planning for and responding to Emergencies in Cockfield is the responsibility of the **COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLANNING GROUP** which comprises:

The **EMERGENCY CO-ORDINATION GROUP** - which is responsible for activating the Plan and coordinating response activities. Its members are Parish Councillors and representatives of other community organisations.

COMMUNITY CO-ORDINATORS - who undertake and co-ordinate response activities in one of 6 allocated areas within our widespread village. In particular they will identify and support any vulnerable residents who may need assistance. We are currently seeking a Community Co-ordinator for Windsor Green and the surrounding area.

REST CENTRE CO-ORDINATORS - who will manage the operation of a Rest Centre (the Village Hall) in the event of residents and any other people needing temporary shelter.

In addition **VOLUNTEERS** will play an essential part in responding to emergency events by undertaking specific tasks at the request of the Emergency Coordination Group.

The Emergency Co-ordination Group would be very pleased and grateful to hear from any residents and members of the farming community who have the relevant skills, equipment and vehicles, and would be prepared to be included in the Emergency Plan register of volunteers. Help could be needed in the following ways:

Clearance of roads blocked by snow, fallen trees or abandoned vehicles (note: chainsaw users must be certificated).

Recovering residents and drivers who are directly affected by flooding or are snowbound, or transporting carers or food / medical supplies to vulnerable or isolated residents. (note: 4x4 vehicles should have sufficient power and road clearance for such situations).

Administer First Aid (note: up-to date training / qualifications is required). Assist the Rest Centre Co-ordinators with catering and supporting residents and other people needing temporary shelter.

Support the Community Co-ordinators in their local areas.

If you would like to volunteer your services to help in any of the ways outlined above or would like to be the Community Co-ordinator in the Windsor Green Area, in the first instance please contact Mark Webster (emergency.plan@cockfield.org.uk).

Details of the members of the Emergency Co-ordination Group and the Community Co-ordinators will be included in a further Green Links update and on the village Website as soon as possible.

In the event that the Cockfield Emergency Plan is activated, communications advising residents of the actions being taken will be issued via the Cockfield Community Broadcast e-mail (residents can subscribe for this service at cockfield.org.uk) and the Community Co-ordinators. Information may also be broadcast on BBC Radio Suffolk.

Useful information about preparing yourself for emergencies can be found at www.suffolkresilience.com/prepare-yourself

It is important to remember that the Emergency Plan exists to support, not replace, the work of the Emergency Services / Local Authorities.

In the event of any local emergency, if there is **ANY threat to life**, **dial 999** and alert the emergency services (Police, Fire, or Ambulance) immediately. If there is no perceived threat to life, but you have **information** that may help the emergency services, **dial 101**.

Microsoft Edge, Windows

If you use Microsoft's browser, Edge, to access the internet, it's possible you may get a message pop up informing you that

Microsoft Edge is using the Webcam

This is a bit alarming as you may not be doing anything at the time to suggest that Edge would need to use the webcam: the message appears to pop up at random. To control this behaviour, you need to make a setting change in Microsoft Edge:

- Click the settings button the 3 dots at the far right of the top row of the Edge window.
- This opens a menu of choices, click Settings near the bottom of the list the Settings options open up as a new browser tab.
- In the left sidebar, select the setting Cookies and Site Permissions
- In the main right hand panel, scroll down to the section All Permissions, in which you will see a setting labelled Camera. Click this setting to select it.
- The setting 'Ask before accessing (Recommended)' should be switched on.
- With this setting set to on, in future any Edge site that wants to access the camera will trigger a message informing you and giving you the option to allow or disallow.

Microsoft Windows


When Windows 10 was released in 2015, Microsoft declared a strategy which said that future changes to Windows would happen as updates to Windows 10 and the cycle of major product releases such as Windows 7, 8, 10 would end. I suppose any strategy only lasts as long as the next one, and sure enough Microsoft have announced Windows 11.

Many of the new features trailed so far relate to the user interface and the look of Windows rather than substantive changes to the functional elements of Windows. More details will emerge in the coming months prior to its release, forecast around the end of October. Windows 11 is said to be free to users of Windows 10 and that it will be optional – support for Windows 10 will continue for some time.

Anyone with a particular interest will find plenty of online articles and YouTube videos discussing the content of Windows 11, and I'll summarise key information in the coming months.

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August's Advice Column

I've been living in my privately rented flat for years. I generally have a good relationship with my landlord, but I just can't get them to carry out various repairs that have built up. How can I get them to act - and what exactly do they have to do?



This must be a very frustrating situation. The law states that your landlord must provide accommodation that is safe, healthy and free from things that could cause serious harm.

You don't say exactly what repairs are needed. If you have problems such as electrical wiring that you think might be faulty, or there's damp, or an infestation by pests, the landlord has a legal obligation to put things right.

Landlords are also responsible for the maintenance of the general structure, and fittings such as boilers and radiators; basins, baths and toilets; and the drains.

The first step is to contact your landlord again, in writing. Include photographs of the problems. Keep a record of all communications and evidence relating to the disrepair.

If that doesn't prompt any action, the housing advisers at Citizens Advice can help with next steps. These could include contacting your local council (who will have dedicated officers for dealing with disrepair in private rented properties) or asking for a visit by the environmental health team.

Tenants can take their landlords to court to force them to carry out repairs. However, it's worth getting some advice and thinking carefully before embarking on this route.



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
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The sad tale of Achan's sin is recorded in Joshua chapter 7, where we see that Achan stole the 'devoted things' and it did not end well for him. By his own admission he said that he saw these things, coveted them and then took them (verse 20). Sound familiar? It should because this is exactly what Eve did, which brought about original sin that in turn, had such tragic consequences for the whole of mankind (Genesis 3).

In the same way, Achan's sin had far reaching consequences for his nation (verses 4 & 5) as well as for him personally (verse25) and all for what? He derived not one iota of benefit from his theft. He was not able to spend his ill-gotten gains, they did not make his life any easier or happier and it is arguable that he even got to look at the items he stole for any appreciable length of time, as immediately he acquired them, he buried them (verse 20). And so what was the point of his theft?

Achan, no doubt thought that he would get away with the theft. We can almost hear him saying: "Who's to know? There is no one about to see what I am doing and I can get a major benefit from taking these things. It will set me up for life". But God who sees everything (2 Chronicles 16:9) will reward accordingly (Jeremiah 17:10) and as Achan proved for himself, sins will find you out (Numbers 32:23) and assuredly there will always be consequences (James 1:15).

Achan was tempted and yielded to that temptation. Temptation itself is not a sin but yielding to it is. Jesus is our example as has been there Himself. "He was in all wise tempted but without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). He resisted temptation and gained the victory over it. By looking to Him we can try to do the same (1 Corinthians 10:13). We will not always succeed but if we fail and are truly repentant the grace of God is such that "if we confess our sins then God is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9); the corollary being that there is no cleansing from unconfessed sin.

Achan failed to acknowledge his sin and repent of it until the very end when he had been found out, by which time it was too late and he carried the full penalty of his sin - which should serve as a warning to us all.

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
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
