Garden Tips for April 2023

Flowers & Grasses

- Sow hardy annuals, herbs and wild flower seeds outdoors.
- Order annual plug plants geranium, petunias, begonias online or from a reputable supplier's catalogue. Spread the cost by splitting the cost of order with friends & family.
- In late April cut back your Penstemons down to the base of the plant provided that you can see new growth. Alternatively, cut back to just above a new pair of leaves.
- Primroses Once they have finished flowering lift and divide. This encourages the plant to produce more flowers in the following year.



- Remove faded flowers from winter flowering pansies and violas to stop them setting seed. This will prolong the flowering period.
- In the greenhouse nip out pinch out the growing tips of fuchsias. This will encourage new side shoots and will result in a much bushier plants.
- Sweet pea plants raised from seed in a greenhouse can be planted out now providing the soil is workable/not frozen
- Continue to deadhead Daffodils and Tulips but allow the foliage to die down naturally as this builds up the bulb for the next season.
- Towards the end of the month plant up hanging baskets and containers. Don't forget to add slow release fertiliser and water-retaining gel. Keep under cover until all danger of frost has passed.
- If you have a spare patch of ground sow a packet of wildflower seeds. This will encourage pollinators into your garden.
- Remove dead growth from ornamental grasses.
- Apply a general purpose fertiliser to beds and borders. Take care not to spread over any emerging shoots as this will burn them.



Fruit and Vegetables

- Consider building a raised bed to take some of the bending out of growing vegetables.
- Sow seed outdoors for beetroot, carrots, Swiss chard, lettuce, radish and perpetual spinach. Make sure that the soil has been well prepared.
- Feed raspberry canes and other fruit bushes sprinkling a slow release fertiliser around the base of the plants.



- Good time to buy vegetable plug plants.
- Pot up tomato seedlings once they have developed true leaves above the more rounded seed leaves.
- If your asparagus bed is at least 2 years old you can cut the spears when they are no more than 18cm tall. They will be tender and so delicious.
- Apple, pear, plum and cherry trees will start flowering this month. In very cold or windy weather protect blossoms with fleece.
- Keep watering newly planted fruit trees regularly
- Mulch fruit trees with well- rotted manure but make sure it doesn't touch the actual trunk.
- Support pea and bean plants now with twiggy sticks.

Trees, Shrubs & Climbers

- Roses Climbers and ramblers Tie in new growth horizontally to your trellis or wires. During any prolonged periods of dry weather make sure new plants are watered. Continue adding fertiliser in accordance with the supplier's instructions.
- Roses grown in containers should be watered regularly especially during prolonged dry periods and fed with a proprietary rose feed.
- Mulch shrub borders with a good layer (5-8cm) of organic matter such as well-rotted manure. This will help retain moisture and improve soil structure.
- After flowering hard prune Forsythia back to strong new shoots.
- Tie in new honeysuckle and clematis stems.

Lawns

- Repair any bare patches. Lightly fork the bare patch and water. Then apply a thin layer of compost. Sow the lawn seed thinly. Cover with another thin layer of compost. Keep moist.
- Apply specialist high nitrogen lawn feed and weed killers.
- Mow Lawn regularly and lower the blades towards the end of the month.

General Maintenance and planning

- Make sure bird baths are clean and filled with fresh water.
- Check your compost bins to see if you have any ready to use.
- Keep a separate garden diary to note what seeds you have sown and what you have planted.
- Don't forget your houseplants. As the days become longer and warmer they may require more water. Always refer to the plant's specific care label.
- Weed and clean patios and paths.
- Make sure you give your Greenhouse a thorough clean before the growing season is in full swing.
- Make sure there is fresh water in low saucers for Hedgehogs.
- Leave a flat stone in the garden so that Thrushes have something to smash snail shells on.
- Divide and replant waterlilies once they are showing signs of growth.
- If the water in your pond goes from clear to greenish and persists consider adding oxygenating plants.



Charles shared some of his memories and amusing stories relating to Dad's Army and in particular his memories of the actors as well as the writer Jimmy Perry and producer David Croft. He worked with them both for many years. Dad's Army, for instance ran for 80 episodes over the years. Unfortunately three epi-

sodes were lost for ever but the scripts remained and were remade a few years ago, using the original scripts



Charles has been an actor, writer, composer, television director, producer and more recently an author. He re-edited most of the classic comedy archives for the BBC, where he worked for 15 years, including Dad's Army, Steptoe & Son, Are You Being Served?, Porridge, The Good Life and many others. Dad's Army, for instance, had to be carefully edited so that episodes fitted in a precise time frame of 29 minutes and 15 seconds. It took him a week to adjust each episode and 77 weeks to complete his work on the existing 77 episodes. He spoke very fondly of the writer, Jimmy Perry, who he described as an eccentric and the producer David Croft OBE, as well as the cast. All of which made the programme so successful and memorable! We thoroughly enjoyed the meeting!



The Americans in Suffolk part 3a - Flying the Missions

It's hard to wander on the old perimeter track on the airfield site at Lavenham and not imagine what it must have been like there in those dramatic ten months when the airfield was active and home to the four bomber squadrons that made up the 487th Bomb Group. Between 4th May 1944 and 21st April 1945 the 487th BG (tail code P in a square) flew 185 combat missions and dispatched a total of 6021 sorties. A sortie is one aircraft departing the airfield. In the course of those missions the Group dropped a total of 14021 tons of bombs and lost 48 aircraft to enemy action. The Group started out flying the B-24 Liberator, but in August 1944 the Group converted to the B-17G.

Of the other three Groups in and around Cockfield that made up the 4th Combat Bomb Wing (as well as the 385th BG at Elmswell), the 94th Bomb Group (A in a square), based just to the East of Bury St Edmunds, flew its first mission almost one year earlier on 13th May 1943, and took part in the ferocious air battles that raged in the skies over Germany in the summer and autumn of 1943, including the two disastrous missions to Schweinfurt when 60 B-17s were shot down during each of these two missions. The 94th flew 324 missions and lost 153 aircraft. What a difference a year makes. The 447th Bomb Group over at Rattlesden (K in a square) flew its first mission on the 24th December and flew 257 missions for the loss of 97 B-17s. Finally, the 486th BG at Sudbury (W in a square) made its debut on 7th May 1944, flew 188 missions for the loss of 33 aircraft, an operational career similar to that of the 487th. So from the four airfields in our local area, 331 aircraft left from these anirfields and never came back. That's 3310 men chalked off the Order of Battle. That's a sobering thought. In this part of the story I'll have a closer look at how a typical mission was planned and launched by the 487th.

Planning and carrying out a mission was a huge logistical effort and started when the Field Order from HQ 4th Bomb Wing at Bury St Edmunds came clattering through on the Telex printers late in the evening at the Group Operations Block. I have shown where this is on the wartime air photograph, and the current air photo. The Field Order gave the number of aircraft required, bomb loads, fuel loads, expected opposition, Initial Point and Rally Point.

The receipt of this order would trigger a chain of events which would culminate in the heavily laden bombers lifting off from the runway at Lavenham the following morning.

First of all a warning order would go out to the squadron COs and engineering



officers, notifying them that the Group had been alerted for a mission. For operational security the base would be locked down

by the Military Police, no one in or out. No phone calls allowed. Turns out that these would not be the last lockdowns in Suffolk....Meanwhile, the Squadrons would report back to Group HQ on the number of aircraft available, and the armourers and ordnance staff would start preparing the bomb loads. In mid 1944 a Squadron would have up to 12 aircraft on charge, although this had risen to 18 by late 1944. Ammunition for the thirteen .50 calibre machine guns would be loaded aboard each aircraft, and fuel bowsers would bring the fuel to the aircraft and start loading the fuel. In mid 1944 a Group would be expected to put up around 30 aircraft for a mission.

As soon as the target details, routes and timings came through from Wing, the Group Navigation officer and his staff would start preparing the flight plans, and the briefing officer would start planning the sequence of briefings, which would normally start about three hours before take off. First to be pre-briefed would be the lead pilots, navigators and bombardiers of each squadron. This would take place about an hour before the main briefing, which typically would be at about 5am, or "zero dark hundred", as the crews liked to say.

The bomber crews would be woken by the Charge of Quarters, who would come

into the accommodation huts and shine a torch into faces of those rostered to fly with the words "breakfast in half an hour, briefing at five". What this must have been like, on a frozen, misty Suffolk winter's morning in a cold, damp Nissan hut I cannot say. The crews had to make their way from their accommodation to the communal mess halls, also shown on the photos. Most had bicycles, but doubtless some walked in darkness down the newly laid concrete roads. To be continued. Jeremy Gardner



Summary Report of the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting held on 19th January 2023

BMSDC Public Realm Land (Dukes Meadow): SCC Cllr Lindsay has advised that SCC Highways Enforcement team are reviewing with BMSDC to ascertain boundaries such they can engage with the land owner on the fence position.

Local Needs Housing: The Clerk has completed the application for 'Granting of a new right of common and application for registration of a right in the commons register', which needs to be signed by a JP or practising Solicitor. However, the application is on hold until there is clarity on further land available from SCC.

Highways & Emergencies (Mill Corner Footpath): Discussions with the authority and landowner continue to seek an agreeable solution.

Playground: Cllr Golding confirmed that he had been unable to fill the hollows under the slides of the multi-activity centres due to adverse weather conditions.

The Clerk and Cllr Morley met APL Ltd who have adjusted the tension on the Zip Wire and tightened some fixings on the see-saw.

APL Ltd have provided a quote for a new Picnic Table and Bench on an Astroturf, but are still outstanding to provide their quote for additional play equipment.

EV Charging Point at the VH Car Park: The Council were advised that The Village Hall Management Committee at this time rejected the proposal for an EV Charging Facility due to concerns for power availability / infrastructure issues.

Parish Paths: The Parish Council had not received any response from SCC after raising safety concerns about the footpath bridge on the Abbey Footpath. Correspondence was to be forwarded to SC Cllr Lindsay to enable him to pursue the matter internally with SCC.

Local Needs Housing Jeffreys Green: The Parish Council had met with SCC 19/01/23 to discuss the transfer of SCC land to Cockfield Parish Council.

Police/Fire:

It was confirmed that the police speed checks requested by the Council were in operation w/c 09/01/23 in the Cross Green area.

Public Participation Session:

The Clerk had circulated SCC Cllr Lindsay's report in advance of the meeting. SCC Cllr Lindsay highlighted several items from the report, namely that SCC would be increasing their precept by 4%, that skirting back the footpaths between the Horseshoes and Cross Green was in progress and that SCC had completed 17 drainage schemes and that SCC Highways have visited the development site behind Mortimer Rd about the mud on the road and verge damage.

District Cllr Arthey advised that his Locality Budget donation towards the Parish Council's purchase of the mower had been approved.

Cross Green: It was agreed to procure treatment to improve the condition of the grass.

Budget 2023-2024: <u>The</u> Budget previously discussed in detail at the November's Parish Council Meeting and subject to agreed minor amendments was approved.

Precept: It was agreed that the Precept of £50,780 be approved. It was noted that the Parish Council would not be increasing its element of the Cockfield Council Tax (for the 3rd year running).

Neighbourhood CIL - Bus Stop Project: The Clerk provided Cllrs with a progress update on the lease, funding, the project installation programme. The Clerk has issued a Village Community Broadcast confirming the traffic management arrangements.

Neighbourhood CIL Expenditure: The Clerk explained the Neighbourhood CIL Expenditure report, including the forecast expenditure up to 31 March and the future projects allocated for Neighbourhood CIL funding.

Glebe Land (Allotments): It was confirmed that the meeting with the current seven applicants expressing an interest in renting an allotment was scheduled for 29 January. The hard standings had been laid but further work was required by the contractor to complete the work to the Parish Council's satisfaction.

Pavilion: As part of on-going enhancements it was agreed that the football club be allowed to rehang the kitchen door to provide a better layout.

Councillors noted that the notice board on the corner of Great Green was getting discoloured due to water under the varnish and remedial work be scheduled on the maintenance calendar.

Local Needs Housing: It was confirmed that 3 of the 4 smaller self-build plots on the Jeffreys Green Housing development had been sold.

Highways and Emergencies: Cllr Cutting-Keyton confirmed that the Keep Cockfield Tidy Litter Pick would be on 18 & 19 March.

Police/Fire: Councillors learnt of the Police Commissioner's proposal to increase the Police Precept by £15 per Band D property.

King Charles Coronation: Councillors were advised a working group including members of the Community Council were investigating options for a modest event.

Allotment Tenancy Agreement: Councillors agreed the draft Allotment Tenancy Agreement document to be used going forward.

Recipes for Picnics

Hopefully the weather will be kind when King Charles III is crowned! We may be thinking of having a picnic to celebrate or just have an opportunity to spend some time with family and friends. I have a few ideas for recipes which could make a tasty addition to any food you prepare to share then or when



summer arrives. A traditional coronation chicken (invented for Queen Elizabeth's coronation) is great served in sandwiches for a picnic or in jackets/ with salads at any time. It is also an opportunity to use up left over chicken. The recipes contain some store cupboard items and things you can store in the fridge and use multiple times. Always check the storage instructions.

Vegan Sausage Rolls

Ingredients

250 g chestnut mushrooms
3 tbsp olive oil
2 leeks, finely chopped
2 large garlic cloves, crushed
1 tbsp finely chopped sage leaves
1 tbsp miso paste
2 tsp Dijon mustard
30 g chestnuts, very finely
chopped
70 g fresh white breadcrumbs
1 x 320 g sheet ready rolled puff
pastry (not all butter version)
Plain flour for dusting
Dairy free milk (like soya milk) to
glaze

<u>Method</u>

Chop the mushrooms finely or use a food processor on pulse. Put ½ the olive oil in a large frying pan, add the leeks and a pinch of salt and fry gently for 15 mins until softened and golden brown. Set the leeks to one side to cool.

Heat the remaining oil in the pan and fry the mushrooms for 10 mins over a medium heat. Add the garlic, sage, miso and mustard and fry for a further minute. Leave to cool. Heat the oven to 180 C fan. Combine the mushroom mixture with the leeks in a bowl. Add the chestnuts and breadcrumbs. Season then mix everything together.

Unroll the pastry on a floured surface, Roll out the pastry until it measures 43 cm. Then mould the mushroom and leek mixture into a sausage shape down the centre of the pastry. Bring the pastry up around the filling and seal along the seam with a fork Seal with a little brush of milk. Cut into 10 pieces. Lay on the parchment to bake or a lightly oiled non-stick baking sheet. Brush with milk. Bake for 25 mins or until golden brown. Leave to cool a little and sprinkle with sesame seeds before serving.

Coronation Chicken

Ingredients

100 g mayonnaise
100 g thick natural yogurt
2 tbsp mango chutney
2 tbsp of madras curry powder (toasted)
4 dried apricots or 2 tbsp of raisins
2 spring onions spring onions
A squeeze lemon juice
½ small bunch of coriander finely chopped
½ tsp nigella seeds
400 g leftover roast chicken or cooked
chicken shredded
1 tbsp flaked almonds (optional)

Peanut Butter Cookie Cups Ingredients

175 g butter, softened
200 g light brown soft sugar
100 g golden caster sugar
1 tbsp vanilla extract
1 large egg
250 g plain flour
½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
150 g dark chocolate (70% cocoa solids)
240 g peanut or almond butter

Method

Mix the mayo, yogurt, chutney, curry powder, apricots and spring onions with some seasoning in a large bowl. Add a squeeze of lemon juice to taste, then add the coriander, nigella seeds and shredded chicken. Use in sandwiches or in jackets etc. when you may want to top with a sprinkle of more nigella seeds, coriander or flaked almonds.

<u>Method</u>

Heat the oven to 170 C fan. Put the butter, sugars and vanilla into a bowl and beat with an electric whisk until pale and fluffy. Beat in the egg. Add the flour, bicarb and a pinch of salt, then mix everything together with a spatula. Break off golf ball sized lumps of dough (about 65 g each) and press into the holes of a 12 hole muffin tin, ensuring it comes up the sides (using a deep muffin tin the dough should come halfway up the sides of each hole). Bake for 15 mins until golden. The dough will sink as it bakes, so leave to cool until cool enough to handle, then press it up the sides of the holes again. Leave to cool completely.

Break the chocolate into a bowl and melt until smooth in the microwave in 20 second bursts or set over a pan of barely simmering water (the bowl must not touch the water). Remove the cookie cups from the tin using a knife, if necessary. Spoon 1 tsp of the nut butter into the centre of each cup and then cover with melted chocolate. Leave to cool until the chocolate sets, about 1 hour. Will keep in an airtight container for up to five days.





Advice Column

I ordered a watch online with personalised engraving for my partner's upcoming 40th birthday. The company has since gone out of business. I keep phoning and emailing them but can't get through to anyone. I'm assuming they can't fulfil my order, but I'd paid for the watch upfront and can't afford to buy another gift until I get my money back, please help.

I understand the frustration you must be feeling - especially as you've already parted with your money and presumably spent time searching for a suitable gift for your partner's special birthday. I assume you haven't had a dispatch note yet, which suggests the order isn't on its way.

If the company's gone into administration, it may still be able to fulfil outstanding orders, but if the company is already in liquidation, you'll need to try to get your money back. If you're unsure about what state the company is in, the Citizens Advice website has information on how to find out.

As the company hasn't responded to your calls or emails, is there a shop or office you can visit or write to, to get an update on your order, or request a refund? If that isn't possible, the next steps depend on whether it's a limited company (it will have ltd or plc after its title) or if it's a sole trader (someone who runs their own business) or partnership.

If it's a limited company, you'll need to get details of the administrator or receiver - the person dealing with settling the trader's debts. The names of those administrators will usually be on the website of the company that's gone bust. You should register your claim as a creditor on the GOV.UK website. Fill out the form with details of what you're owed and send it to the administrator dealing with the trader's debts.

Unfortunately, there's only a small chance you'll receive any money back because you'll be last in a long list of creditors who need to be paid.

As the order was online (and I'm therefore assuming you paid by debit or with credit card) you could also try getting your money back with a Section 75 claim or a charge-back claim to your card provider or bank. Full details about both these types of claims can be found on the Citizens Advice website, <u>www.citizensadvice.org.uk</u>

If the seller was a sole trader or partnership and not a limited company, pursuing a Section 75 or chargeback claim is your best option. Every case is different when traders go under, but you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline to find out exactly what your rights are: telephone 0808 223 1133 and visit <u>https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/somethings-gone-wrong-with-a-purchase/if-a-company-stops-trading-or-goes-out-of-business/</u>

From May 2023, voters have to show photo ID at polling stations before they are given a ballot paper.

- passports
- photographic driver's licences (including provisional)
- Blue Badges
- Concessionary travel passes

What to do when you have no photo ID

If you do not have one of the accepted forms of photo ID and you would like to vote, you need to apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate.

This certificate is a free photo ID document that will allow you to vote.

You can apply for a certificate from Monday 16 January 2023.

Pontius Pilate was the Roman governor of Judea, between A.D. 26-36, and is widely known for overseeing the mock trial of Jesus, by which He was condemned to death on the trumped up charges brought by the Jewish religious leaders of the day. These leaders were jealous of Jesus's popularity among the people, which they saw as a threat to their own authority and standing, and so when Jesus claimed to be God, (John 10:30) they accused Him of blasphemy, the penalty for which, under their law, was stoning to death (Leviticus 24:16). However, under Roman occupation they had lost the right to impose this punishment and so, they brought Jesus to Pilate, alleging that He had been guilty of sedition, the penalty for which was death under Roman law.

Pilate, however, was reluctant to convict Jesus because he saw the allegations brought against Him were "baseless" (Luke 23:14) and so declared Him to be innocent (Luke 23:22). Thus, his conscience was already bothering him, when his wife sent him an urgent message concerning Jesus, telling him: "Don't have anything to do with this innocent man, for I have suffered a great deal today in a dream because of him" (Matthew 27:19). But Pilate did not want any trouble from the crowd and so sought to appease them, by asking whether he should set free, Jesus or Barabbas - a convicted robber and murderer. Those plotting against Jesus managed to persuade the crowd to call for the release of Barabbas (Matthew 27:20–21). And so, giving in to them, Pilate authorised the greatest crime of all time - the crucifixion of Jesus (Mark 15:15).

Pilate, having been pivotal in this evil deed, nevertheless had in the accusation placed over the head of Jesus on the cross saying: "This is Jesus the King of the Jews" (Matthew 27:37). This displeased the religious leaders who wanted the wording changed to say that Jesus "only said" He was the king of the Jews. But Pilate replied: "What I have written, I have written"(John 19:21-22), demonstrating that he knew the truth about Jesus.

By tradition, the Eastern Orthodox Church hold that both Pilate and his wife eventually became Christians. If so, this demonstrates the inestimable grace of God that extends even to the one who was instrumental in the trial and execution of His only begotten son. But, as Fanny Crosby the hymn writer correctly wrote: "......The vilest offender who truly believes that moment from Jesus a pardon receives". And this is the reason why we celebrate Easter.


