Garden Tips for July 2023

Flowers and Herbs

- Continue to deadhead roses and cut back perennials such as Lupins and Delphiniums to encourage a 2nd flush of flower.
- To keep borders tidy cut back any faded perennials.
- Dahlias continue tying new growth to stakes. Apply liquid fertiliser at least once a fortnight. Remove faded flowers regularly.
- Deadhead and tidy hanging baskets. Water twice a day in very hot weather early morning and dusk.
- Pick, dry and freeze herbs for use in winter months.
- Flower seeds to sow in July Delphiniums, Wallflowers, Foxgloves, Sweet Williams, Violas and Pansies.
- Divide and replant congested clumps of bearded Iris.
- Continue to pick Sweet Peas every day and remove any seed pods to prolong the flowering period.
- Always water around the base of a plant rather than the foliage.
- Garden pests are at their most voracious so it's good to have some 'Garden Buddies' -French Marigolds have a strong odour and when planted alongside tomatoes or grown in



pots in the Greenhouse will deter greenfly, blackfly and whitefly. If you are growing melons they will also repel beetles.

• Roses under planted with Lavender will deter greenfly and look good too.

 To keep those Hosta leaves looking good make a Garlic wash. You will need 2 bulbs of Garlic and 2 pints of water. Crush the Garlic and boil in the 2 pints of water for 3 – 4 minutes. Strain the mixture and leave to cool. Store in an airtight jar. When ready to use mix 1 tablespoon into a watering can of 5 litres of wa ter. With the rose attached sprinkle the Hosta leaves. This should be ap plied in late afternoon and when the weather is dry. Hopefully this should keep slugs and snails at bay.

• In dry weather containers dry out very quickly and may need watering in the early morning and evening. Try to conserve water by using water butts and grey water wherever possible.

Fruit and Vegetables

- Apply high Potash fertiliser once fruits appear on peppers, cucumbers and tomatoes. This also works for sunflowers too.
- Pick courgettes before they become marrows. Apparently Courgettes help with blood pressure so eat plenty. Pinch out the tops of climbing beans. This will encourage lower side shoots to form.
- To minimise tomato blight try and water your plants in the morning. Soggy foliage in the evening encourages blight.
- Feed tomatoes at least once a week with a diluted proprietary tomato fertiliser.
- Clear spent and any diseased foliage on and around vegetable plants to keep them healthy.
- Raspberries are shallow rooted so will need to be watered regularly during hot and dry spells of weather.
- After harvesting prune the fruited stems of Blackcurrants.
- Pepper plants will benefit if potted on to larger pots.
- Pick runner beans regularly to prevent them from becoming stringy and to make room for developing pods.



• In warm weather water your fruit and vegetable crops daily.

Trees, Shrubs and Climbers

- Prune Plum, Apricot and Cherry trees to reduce the risk of Silver Leaf disease.
- Thin out fruit on your fruit trees to encourage good sized fruit.
- Fast growing hedges like Leyland Cypress should be clipped as necessary throughout the growing season. However you should always check for nesting birds before doing so.
- Ensure that any newly planted shrubs and trees do not dry out.



Lawns

- In dry weather ensure new lawns are watered and aerated with a garden fork.
- Lawns can also benefit from a proprietary summer feed especially if not given a spring feed.
- Don't allow new lawns to dry out.

General Maintenance and Planning

- Order catalogues or checkout the internet for next year's spring flowering bulbs.
- Continue to keep your Greenhouse well ventilated and humid.
- Tidy up fallen leaves and flowers to discourage the spread of fungal disease.
- July is a good time to spray persistent weeds such as ground elder and bindweed as they are at the height of their surface area and will absorb the weed killer more efficiently.
- Take advantage of dry weather to paint and preserve sheds, fences and garden furniture.
- Remove floating blanket weed from your pond by twirling around a cane. Before composting leave in a pile close to the edge to allow wildlife to return to the pond.
- Keep watching out for the dreaded vine weevil beetles and grubs. These tend to hide out in pots of new plants and containers. The grubs feed on roots, corms and tubers. You can treat with biological controls such as nematodes which are available online. As soon as you receive them they need to be watered in. Evening is



- the best time so that the compost doesn't dry out too quickly.
- There are other proprietary liquid treatments available but you should always check suitability before using on anything you plan to harvest and eat.

It is beautiful and interesting at all times of year as well. It was actually voted 2022 RHS Partner Garden of the Year for the Midlands and

East of England. It sits between the pines of the King's Forest and the pools of Lackford Lakes (a nature reserve). 'An atmospheric woodland garden divided by the River Lark'.

In July our speaker is Lou Chapman, a local artist. Her talk is entitled 'The Tale of a Fortunate Woman'. She will tell us about her passion for painting and how she achieved her childhood ambition to be a professional artist. She will bring examples of her bright contemporary work and greetings cards.

We are also helping to provide refreshments at the village fete on Sunday 16th July. It would be great if members could provide a cake (please check with Michelle first to see what is needed). It is open to everyone and everyone is very welcome to share some lovely homemade cakes and biscuits, as well as tea and coffee. The next two Thursday coffee mornings are from 10.30 am until 12 noon and are on the 27th July and 24th August, in the Village Hall Committee room. The monthly coffee mornings will therefore, continue throughout the summer! Our monthly Saturday lunches, offered soup in the winter months and more recently jacket potatoes and most recently a ploughman's lunch. They have been very enjoyable and well attended. TIPS AND TRICKS

WI Tips & Recipes for Storing and Using Salads – Summer is here!!!!!

Salad such as tomatoes, cucumber and leafy salad can be stored, if kept in the right conditions.

Tips for Storing Tomatoes.

Store them at room temperature if possible and away from anything that can bruise their delicate skin. It is best to only store tomatoes in the fridge if you want to delay 'just ripe' tomatoes from turning too soft. It is suggested you only keep them in the fridge for a short time (no more than 2 days) as in this ripe state they don't lose much flavour. Use your salad tray and keep them apart. If you store tomatoes there, store them if possible, stem down as less moisture is absorbed that way. If they have been in the fridge take them out before use so that they can return to room temperature. If you have very under ripe tomatoes they can be placed in a brown paper bag with a banana (monitor).

The fridge's cold environment turns tomatoes mealy and mushy. They lose flavour and texture –monitor carefully.

Tips for Storing Cucumbers

The description 'as cool as a cucumber' does it a disservice. Cucumbers don't actually like to be cold, according to experts. Fridges can actually speed up spoilage. I remain unconvinced but have been informed that they keep longer when stored at room temperature. If you keep them in the fridge make sure they are kept dry and tightly wrapped in kitchen paper or a cloth/tea towel. Also keep cucumbers away from other salads and fruits like tomatoes, bananas and melons. (The ethylene gases they emit as they ripen will ripen the cucumber faster.)

Tips for Storing Salad Leaves

Firstly keep them as dry as possible. Excess moisture will render salad leaves inedible very quickly. Pat gently with kitchen paper and then seal in a container with fresh kitchen paper and where possible, keep them in the salad drawer of the fridge. If kept in the salad drawer clean tea towels or fresh kitchen paper can be placed on top and below the salad. If you have a bag of prepared leaves, open it and gently add a folded sheet of kitchen paper or two! If you are going to use them straight away keep them out of the fridge. If you (only if necessary) need to wash them before use then the 'recipe' recommends using 2 quarts of cold water, ½ cup white vinegar and ½ cup table salt. Rinse very well, drain and pat dry thor-

oughly. Leafy vegetables can be treated in the same way.

Recipes

Chicken Caesar Salad (Serves 4) Ingredients 1 medium ciabatta loaf or 4 thick slices of crusty white bread 3 tbsps olive oil 2 skinless, boneless chicken breasts 1 large cos or romaine lettuce – leaves separated



Dressina

1 garlic clove

2 anchovies from a tin

Medium block of Parmesan cheese for grating & shaving (you won't use it all) 5 tbsps good quality mayonnaise

1 tbsp white wine vinegar

Heat oven to 180c fan. Tear the bread into croutons or cut with a knife. Spread over a large baking sheet or tray and sprinkle with 2 tbsps olive oil and rub over with a light seasoning of salt crystals (optional). Bake for 8-10 minutes turning a few times. Alternatively fry in a pan being careful not to burn (turn frequently)!

Rub the chicken with the remaining olive oil. Cook the chicken in the pan. Juices should run clear through the thickest part.

In a small bowl put the prepared and crushed clove of garlic, add the mashed anchovies and then add a grated handful of the cheese and mix. Add the mayo. And the vinegar. Season to taste. (It should be the consistency of yogurt).

Shave the cheese as required. Shred the lettuce and add the chicken in bite size pieces and the croutons along with the mixture in the small bowl. Mix and stir. Add further cheese shavings on the top to serve.

10 Minute couscous salad (useful with a barbeque) (Serves 2)

100a couscous 200ml low salt vegetable stock (from a cube is fine) 2 spring onions 1 red pepper 1/2 cucumber 50g feta cheese, cubed 2 tbsps pesto 2 tbsps pine nuts Tip the couscous into a large bowl and pour over the stock. Cover and leave for 10 minutes until fluffy and all the stock has been absorbed. Meanwhile slice the onions and pepper and dice the cucumber. Add these to the couscous, fork through the pesto. Crumble in the feta, then sprinkle over the pine nuts to serve. Greek Salad (Serves 4) 4 large vine tomatoes, cut into wedges 1 cucumber, peeled and deseeded & patted dry 1/2 a red onion, thinly sliced 16 or so kalamata olives 1 tsp dried oregano 85g feta cheese, cut into chunks 4 tbsps extra virgin oil (Greek, if available) Place 4 large vine tomatoes cut into wedges, 1 peeled, deseeded and chopped cucumber, 1/2 thinly sliced red onion, the olives, the oregano, the cheese and the virgin olive oil in a large bowl. Lightly season and serve with crusty bread

VILLAGE FOOTPATHS

As the spring weather warms up and we have more sunny days more people will no doubt be out enjoying a walk on one of the many footpaths in the village. If you spot a problem with a footbridge, or a missing or damaged finger post sign please let me know by sending an email to footpaths@cockfield.org.uk

In the past couple of years I have recorded a few footbridge issues on the Suffolk County Council Public Rights of Way online reporting tool (which anyone can use). Whilst the timescales for any remedial action can vary, if I become aware of any problems I will follow these up, particularly in the case of a footbridge that might be unsafe. I am currently compiling a list of missing and damaged footpath signs and will report these in due course.

It is also the time of year to ask all footpath users to observe the Countryside Code and please keep dogs under control to prevent disturbing ground and hedge nesting birds and other wildlife, such as hares; also to avoid damaging farmer's crops. Hearing and seeing skylarks is one of the great pleasures of walking our footpaths and their ground nests are particularly vulnerable to disturbance. Your co-operation during the spring and early summer seasons is appreciated. Please also take bagged dog mess and any other litter home with you - thank you.

For any new residents in the village you can find a copy of the footpath map in the Welcome Pack on the Cockfield website.







Advice Column



We've booked a package holiday to Spain. It's our first time booking this sort of getaway, and a friend recently had a terrible experience when things went wrong on a similar trip. What sort of help is available if something does go wrong?

Hopefully you'll have a lovely time but if something does go wrong with your package holiday, the Citizens Advice website <u>www.citizensadvice.org.uk</u> has lots of information about what to do if something goes wrong with your holiday and what compensation you may be eligible for. Firstly, tell the company or travel agent you booked with as soon as possible. This way you're more likely to be able to get it sorted quicker. If you don't say anything until you get home, you might get less or no compensation at all.

If the holiday you went on turned out to be lower in value than the one you originally booked, you can make a claim for 'loss of value'. For example, you paid for a deluxe room but only got a standard one, if it wasn't sorted out at the time you can claim back the difference in value. You can also claim compensation for any extra money you have to spend while away, for example the hotel was a bus ride away from the beach rather than across the road as advertised. This is called claiming for 'out-of-pocket' expenses. If this does happen make sure you keep all your receipts for things like bus journeys.

If big parts of the trip you booked didn't happen or services weren't provided, for example a planned two-day excursion was cancelled and no alternative was organised, you can make a claim for 'loss of enjoyment'. You can also make this claim if something happens that causes you distress or disappointment, such as the pool was closed for the whole trip.

It's worth noting that there's no strict guidance on how much you can claim for loss of enjoyment but any claim you make must be reasonable. You can't get compensation if you simply didn't enjoy the holiday or if the problem was out of the holiday company's control - like bad weather.

Check the information you received when you made the booking to see what you're supposed to get. If you don't get the service you've been promised, you may be entitled to compensation for breach of contract. You might also be able to claim from your travel insurance – check if your policy covers this.

If you're still not sure what to do, call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline 0808 223 1133 or talk to an adviser online through the Citizens Advice website.



Congregational Church Corner

The Leaning Tower at Pisa in Italy is some 179 feet high, but its foundations are only ten feet deep. It was built in 1173 and so perhaps the builders did not see the need for deeper foundations in those days, but as "Pisa" means marshy land it would seem that the obvious thing to do was to excavate deeper and more solid foundations, to support the tower in view of its topography. As it is, the tower is listing by about one twentieth of an inch each year and is now some 17 feet out of plumb, all because of inadequate foundations.

Contrast the leaning Tower of Pisa with the Tower of London, the building which was commenced by order of William the conqueror in 1067 and added to over the centuries; and is still standing as strong as ever despite its close proximity to the river Thames.

In the Bible Jesus told a parable about two men who built houses on different foundations. One man built on sand, which collapsed when a storm came along. But the other man built his house on a rock, which stood firm in the storm (Matthew 7: 24 - 27). Both of these men built, but one built on inadequate foundations and his house was destroyed. The other man built on a rock and his house survived the storm. This parable is, of course, a metaphor for Jesus, Himself, who is the rock of our faith. Anything built upon Him will last, but building on any other foundation will fail.

The bible tells us that in the "last days" (i.e. now), some will depart from the true faith in Christ, and rely on fables having "itchy ears" they will seek other doctrines that will lead them astray (1 Timothy 4:1). They will have a "form of Godliness but deny the power thereof" from such, we are told, "to turn away" (2 Timothy 3:5).

When Jesus comes again, to judge the living and the dead (2 Timothy 4:1), He will want to see a pure and unadulterated church to welcome Him. Thus it is that we, His followers, should all be found standing upon Him and His promises, which are rock solid, and will withstand the storms that are not just coming towards us but are here now, and blowing a full gale. As the hymn writer put it:" On Christ the solid rock we stand all other ground is sinking sand". He was right, and all true followers of Jesus should heed this exhortation.


