2023/052 Apologies for Absence: Suffolk County Cllr Robert Lindsay.

2023/053 Declarations of Interest

Cllrs Levett and Cutting-Keyton declared a non-pecuniary Interest in Agenda Item 4 - VH Car Park Maintenance. Cllrs Morley & Cutting-Keyton declared a pecuniary Interest in Agenda Item 7.2 – Payments (as recipients of reimbursements). Cllr Brinkley declared a non-pecuniary interest in Agenda Item 7.3 Pavilion Changing Room Showers Flooring.

2023/054 Minutes of the Last Parish Council Meeting

It was proposed by Cllr Cutting-Keyton and seconded by Cllr Baber that the draft minutes of the Annual Parish Council Meeting, held on 25 May 2023, be signed as a true record. The proposal was carried.

2023/055 Outstanding Actions:

2021/189: BMSDC Public Realm Land: SCC Solicitors have commenced the legal process to recover land on the corner of Dukes Meadow.

The Chairman to write a letter of complaint to BMSDC highlighting BMSDC's responsibility for any future accidents at this junction if a satisfactory conclusion is not achieved.

2021/194: Local Needs Housing: The Clerk has re-submitted the Application for 'Granting of a new right of common and application for registration of a right in the commons register' (after SCC had misplaced the original) and has chased SCC Legal on 22nd & 26th June but has received no update on when approval will be given.

2021/195.2: Highways & Emergencies: Cllr Morley is awaiting a costed proposal from for footpath on their land down Howe Lane. (Action: Remove from outstanding actions at future meetings).

2022/092.2.5: Playground: Cllr Golding confirmed that he had filled the hollows under the slides of the multi-activity centres but this was likely to need further work later in the year. (Action: Closed)

2022/173.1: Damage to Great Green & Grass Verges: The Clerk has posted a report on the SCC Highways website and the problem has been included on the SCC Highways Inspection Schedule and closed out on their website. (Action: Closed)

2022/175.4: VH Car Park Maintenance: Cllr Cutting-Keyton advised that the scaffolding was coming down on 8th July which would allow the work to be undertaken. Due to contractor illness, the Clerk was asked to discuss requirements with an alternative Contractor.

2022/176.1: Bus Stop Project: The Clerk issued a Letter of Thanks to Dawn Edwards, Orwell Housing Association, and received an acknowledgement. **(Action: Closed)**

2022/176.2: Play Equipment: The Clerk and Cllr Morley met with APL on 29th June to negotiate on the quotation received for additional equipment and undertake an inspection and possible rectification of the Zip-Wire seat. Order instructed and equipment to be installed during the school holidays. (Action: Closed)

2022/178: Pavilion Bandstand: The Clerk had received a verbal quotation for the replacement



handrail, but a written quotation, scope of works and drawings are outstanding.

2022/184.1: Reduced Speed Limits: The Clerk to prepare the Parish Council's argument for submission to SC Cllrs Robert Lindsay and Paul West, Cabinet Member for Highways, seeking a meeting on site to discuss proposals.

2023/007.1: Parish Council Investments: The Clerk confirmed advice from SALC that Parish Councils may hold funds in Investment Accounts. Further investigations required. Further investigation required.

2023/010: King Charles III Coronation Event: The Clerk has written a Thank You Letter to Nethergate for their donation of Beer for the event. (Action: Closed)

2023/011.9: Other Assets: Cllr Morley confirmed that S Shepherd & Son had cut the verges in May. Garden Tips for September 2023

Flowers, Bulbs and Herbs

- Collect seed from hardy annuals such as Larkspur, Cosmos, Marigolds and Calendulas.
- Tidy up your pots in readiness for planting up with violas, pansies and spring bulbs etc.
- Continue to feed and deadhead hanging basket and container annuals.
- Sow hardy annuals such as Cerinthes, Scabiosa, Ammi and cornflowers) directly on to prepared seed beds

for an early display next summer.

- Plant spring flowering bulbs such as daffodils, crocus and hyacinths.
- Direct sow hardy annuals where they are to flower. For example cornflowers, annual poppies and poached egg plants.







This keeps plants healthy and maintains vigour. Surplus plants are always popular with family, friends and your local Garden Club.

Fruit and Vegetables

- Spread out newly dug potatoes to dry for a few hours before storing them in paper or hessian bags in a cool dark place.
- Help pumpkins to ripen by removing any leaves which are shadowing the fruit. Try and raise pumpkins and squashes off the ground by placing on a piece of wood or a layer of broken pots you may have. This will prevent rotting.



- Cut bean and pea plants back to ground level once they have finished cropping. Leave the roots in situ to breakdown and release nitrogen back into the soil.
- Pot up strawberry runners by detaching from the parent plant to provide you with extra plants next season.
- Pick off any rotting fruits from your fruit trees as they will spread disease if left.
- Start sowing hardy varieties of broad beans and peas for early crops next year.



Trees, Shrubs, Hedges and Climbers

- Prune any late summer flowering shrubs after they have finished flowering. For example the common deciduous honeysuckle (but not the evergreen varieties which should be pruned in early spring). Escallonia – Prune back the shoots that have flowered. Pyracantha – you can trim back the non-berrying shoots back to the visible berry trusses or spurs to maintain a good shape.
- Conifers hedges Trim back to neaten and control height.
- Now is an ideal time to plant new trees and shrubs. You will find that they will flourish and establish quicker at this time of year. Don't forget to check the eventual height and spread to ensure that they won't outgrow their surroundings or block precious light.



Lawns

• The lawn will benefit by scarifying (scraping out moss with a fine tined rake) and aerating with a garden fork. Follow this with the application of a proprietary Autumn Lawn fertiliser.

General Maintenance and Planning

- Clear out and clean your Greenhouse ready to store tender plants and seedlings over winter.
- Remove shading towards the end of the month to allow maximum light available.
- Water greenhouse plants early in the day so the greenhouse is dry by the evening. Damp cool nights can encourage botryris.
- If you have a pond you should continue to remove blanket and duck weed. This should be left adjacent to the pond to allow any wildlife to return to the pond. After a couple of days you can safely remove the debris to your compost heap.
- Dead leaves should be removed from water lilies. It is also a good time to divide water lilies and other pond plants.
- Net ponds before the autumn leaf fall.
- Water is such a precious commodity so consider installing a water butt.
- Create a compost bin using old wooden pallets. For leaf fall use fine chicken wire and robust bamboo canes.



- Improve clay soil by incorporating horticultural grit and organic matter before the ground becomes too wet or frozen.
- Climate Change Some drought resistant plants to consider for 2024
- Perennials Check each plant variety for ideal growing conditions before purchasing. Achillea, Agapanthus, Artemesia, Bergenia, Crocosmia, Echinops, Eryngiums, Euphorbia, Hardy geraniums, Sedums, Heuchera, Salvia Nemorosa 'Caradonna', Kniphofia, Stachys, Lavender, Phlomis, Gaura and Veronicas.
- Shrubs Abelia, Ceanothus, Perovskia, Eleagnus Angustifolia, Arbutus Unedo.
- Annuals Cerinthe Major, Nicotiana, Zinnia, Californian poppies, Cleome, Cosmos, Sunflowers, Nigella, and Nasturtiums.

Tips & Recipes for Apples

Apples are incredibly tasty and useful! If you want to keep them for a while or even longer term then you need to grow or buy long keeping varieties. These include Granny Smiths, Braeburn or Pink Lady, for example. This would not include Golden Delicious. Freshly picked is, of course best, from an orchard or farmers market. Shop bought apples will inevitably have been picked and shipped some time before!

They should be wrapped individually and put in a lined box or insulated crate and kept in a cold location. If some are kept in the fridge, which is fine, it is suggested you put a few in a clear freezer bag or paper bag and use the crisper drawer. Apples like cold conditions. Make sure they are unblemished first! They cook and freeze very well and are great for pies, sauces, crumbles, chutneys etc.

Like other fruits, apples release ethylene gas as they ripen and can cause other fruits to ripen and spoil too, so please keep them separately.

If they are prepared for cooking, to stop them browning, leave them in salted water or water with some lemon juice and when ready to use or cook, dry them well with a clean tea towel or kitchen paper. Apples will then freeze well!

I have concentrated on 'sweet' recipes!

Apple and Sultana Muffins

Ingredients

200g self-raising flour 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp cinnamon 50g wholemeal flour 100g golden caster sugar 2 large eggs 125 ml semi-skimmed milk 4 tbsp. sunflower oil 2 grated apples 100g sultanas

Method

Heat the oven to 180C/160 fan. In a large bowl mix the flour, wholemeal flour, baking powder, cinnamon and sugar.

In another bowl mix the eggs, milk and oil. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry and mix well. Stir in the grated apples and sultanas. Divide the mix between 12 muffin cases and bake for 20-25 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

Apple Crumble

Ingredients (for the filling) 575g Cooking apples peeled, cored and sliced to 1cm thick- or use dessert apples for a firmer texture 2 tbsp. golden caster sugar Juice of ½ lemon Pinch – ½ tsp cinnamon (to taste)

Ingredients (for the crumble) 175g plain flour 110g golden caster sugar 110g cold butter

Ingredients (for the topping) 1 tbsp. rolled oats 1 tbsp. demerara sugar) 50-100g chopped walnuts (optional) 25-50g sunflower seeds (optional) + double cream or custard, to serve

Method

Heat the oven to 190C/170fan/gas 5

Toss the prepared apples with the caster sugar, the lemon juice and a few teaspoons of water, if you wish, and put in a dish deep enough for the fruit and topping

Put 175g plain flour and the caster sugar in a bowl with a good pinch of salt Slice in the butter and rub it in with your fingertips until mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Alternatively pulse in a processor. Pour the crumb mixture over the fruit evenly and sprinkle the oats and sugar over the top. Extra crunch can be achieved with chopped nuts and also seeds (optional).

Place it on a baking tray and cook in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes, until the top is golden. Leave to cool for 10 minutes before serving.



<u>Apple Pie</u>

Always a favourite! My husband's Nan made the best apple pie, the secret probably being her very light touch. An amazing and lovely lady with a warm heart but cold hands.

Ingredients (for the filling) 5oz golden caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling 1 tsp ground cinnamon 2 tbsp. cornflour 600g/1 lb 5oz Bramley apples or similar, peeled, cored, sliced

Ingredients (For the pastry)
400g/14oz plain flour, plus extra for rolling
2 tbsps. caster sugar
1 lemon, zest only
250g/10oz cold butter, cut into cubes
1 free range egg, beaten with 2 tbsp. cold water plus extra beaten egg to glaze

Method

Preheat the oven to 200gC/180 fan and have a baking sheet ready.

To make the pastry, place the flour, sugar and lemon zest in a bowl and rub in the butter with fingertips (hopefully cold hands) until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add the beaten egg and stir with a round bladed knife until you have a dough. (In the day she would have used ½ lard with the butter and no eggs).

Wrap the pastry and leave in the fridge for at least ½ hour. Set aside one third of the pastry for the lid. Roll out the remaining pastry on a lightly floured surface to the thickness of a pound coin and 5-7cm larger that the pie dish. Very lightly butter the dish and place the pastry in the dish leaving no air bubbles. Some pie makers sprinkle a little semolina in now as this soaks up any extra moisture – may be worth a try!

Place the previously mixed filling in the dish (apples, sugar, cinnamon and cornflour). Roll out the saved pastry and cover the pie with the pastry, brush the rim with a little beaten egg first and then press the edges together firmly to seal (do not stretch as the pastry will shrink). Use a sharp knife to trim off any excess pastry and gently crimp all around the edge. Make a few small holes in the centre with the tip of the knife. Glaze with beaten egg.

Gently re-roll the trimmings. Cut into shapes such as leaves to decorate all around the edge or just in the centre as you wish and glaze again. Sprinkle the pie with sugar and bake in the centre of the oven for 40-55 minutes until golden brown. Joan Ball

Suffolk in the front line - Part 2

In the last article I looked at how the decision came to be made to deploy Thor SM-75 intermediate range ballistic missiles (IRBM) in England. As we have seen, 60 of these missiles were deployed in England as a stop gap measure between 1959 and 1963. These were deployed in four Wings in England, each Wing having five sites, with three missiles per site. In 1963 the missiles were withdrawn and the bases largely abandoned and the deployment moved into history. In this article I will examine how the sites were selected and the operational deployment of the missile.

The first requirement was to select suitable sites. General principles to be followed were that the four satellite bases should be a minimum distance of 12 miles from the HQ base and a maximum of 30 miles from each of the other stations. The 12 mile rule was to ensure survivability in the event of a Soviet nuclear strike on one of the bases. One Soviet missile would not be able to take out more than one site. As it was, Tuddenham was just under 12 miles from its HQ site at Feltwell in Cambridgeshire. The sites in the Feltwell Wing were to be Mepal in Cambridgeshire, Tuddenham and Shepherd's Grove in Suffolk and North Pickenham in Norfolk. Each base would be manned by a specialist, hand picked squadron of dedicated RAF personnel. These were called Strategic Missile squadrons and these are shown on the map. These were the only RAF squadrons ever to bear this designation. These squadrons would maintain and control the missiles, while targeting was to be under joint operational control, relying on the close co-operation of the USAF Strategic Air Command and RAF Bomber Command. The RAF personnel received formal Integrated Weapon System training in Tucson, Arizona before moving onto Vandenberg Air Force Base in California for final training.

Each launch crew comprised a launch control officer, who was usually an RAF Flight Lieutenant of the General Duties branch. This officer was assisted by various ground crew specialist technicians and an American Launch Authentication officer from the USAF holding the rank of Captain. The warheads were always under the control of the US Strategic Air Command, and so there were thus two launch keys.

77(SM) squadron at RAF Feltwell near Lakenheath was the first to receive a Thor missile on 19 September 1958. Almost a year was to follow before 107 (Tuddenham), 82 (Shepherd's Grove), 113 (Mepal) and 220 (North Pickenham) Strategic Missile Squadrons became operational in July 1959. Despite the secrecy surrounding the deployment it did not take long for the residents of the small villages near the bases to realise that they had been thrust into the front line of NATO's nuclear arsenal and could be on the end of a Soviet nuclear strike if the Cold War ever turned 'hot' and war broke out. However, for most of the time the missiles were not visible and lay hidden in their shelters, until brought out and mounted on the hydraulic launcher-erectors on the launch pads for a practice launch. These shelters can be seen in the air photos. The missiles were flown in to England on USAF transport flights into the airhead at Lakenheath, and from there were transported by convoy to the various sites. It must have been quite a strange site to see a ballistic missile on its trailer passing through the countryside on its way to an RAF base.

And what of the missiles themselves? Each missile was 65 feet long and eight feet in diameter. It had to be fuelled with liquid oxygen and kerosene. It had an overall weight of 110,000 lbs when fully fuelled, but of this all up



weight 98,000 lbs was fuel! It had a range of 1500 miles which, from Tuddenham or Shepherd's Grove would take it to Moscow. It would take about 15 minutes from receiving the order to launch to lift off. Each Thor missile was powered by a single Rocketdyne engine which burned for 2.5 minutes, accelerating the missile to 4,400 metres per second. Ten minutes after launch the missile would be at an altitude of 280 miles, close to the highest point of its ballistic trajectory (known as the apogee) and it this point the reentrant vehicle (containing the W-49 thermonuclear warhead) would separate from the main missile body and begin its descent to the target. Each warhead had a yield of approximately 1.5 megatons. From launch to detonation over the target took approximately 18 minutes. On the chart it can be seen that the area of devastation resulting from the blast of a 1.5 MT warhead would cover a circle with a radius of five miles from ground zero.

Fortunately the Thors were never launched in anger, and by 1963 were surplus to requirements. The Thor missiles in Europe did in fact contribute to the Soviet Union's decision to deploy nuclear missiles to Cuba, but that is another story! By 1963 the USA had deployed the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missiles and the RAF's V force of the Valiant, Vulcan and Victor bombers were by then equipped with the Blue Steel stand-off thermonuclear weapon. On 30 June 1969 the UK's independent nuclear deterrent passed from the RAF to the Royal Navy in the form of the Polaris nuclear submarines and the Continuous At Sea Deterrent. This continues to this day with the four Vanguard class boats which carry the Trident D-5 nuclear missiles. By way of comparison, the yield of these Trident warheads is around around 100 Kilotons, far less than those carried by the Thors.

What of the airfields of the Feltwell wing? Those at Tuddenham, Shepherd's Grove, North Pickenham and Mepal have long since disappeared, having been turned over to industrial estates and agricultural use. Only RAF Feltwell still survives. It is used as an accommodation site for United States personnel from the bases at Lakenheath and Mildenhall, and also houses a school for the children of US personnel. The era of the Thor missiles was just another chapter in Suffolk's long association with the United States Air Force, an association which continues to this day with the twin bases at Lakenheath and Mildenhall. Advice Column



My children are starting new schools in September, one is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries. But there is help available.

A good place to start is the Citizens Advice website where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs. The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support. The full list is available on the Citizens Advice website, <u>www.citizensadvice.org.uk</u>

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities, they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from your Local Education Authority if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far. Your Local Education Authority is part of your local council that deals with education in your area, you can find yours on GOV.UK. Contact it directly to find out exactly what support it offers.

If you're on a low income, your Local Education Authority may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get means-tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist.

A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with starting school costs and you're not alone. For more information visit the Citizens Advice website www.citizensadvice.org.uk

Congregational Church Corner

Throughout His earthly ministry Jesus used parables in His teachings to illustrate the spiritual truths of which He spoke. There are some sixty of these parables in the gospels, and one such is the well-known parable of the Sower that we read about in Luke 8: 5-15. The "seed" here, Jesus explained, is the word of God (verse 11), and the differing soils He identifies depict the hearts and minds of mankind amongst whom the seed is sown (verses 12 to 15).

The wayside ground is the ground on the edge of a field where people pass and repass making the ground hard and so the seed just lays on the top of the ground. This represents someone who hears the gospel message but it does not take it to heart. It is superficially received, if at all, and is snatched away before it can have any effect upon him. The message just bounces off of him and is snatched away by the enemy of our souls.

The stony ground depicts a person who professes delight with the Word initially, but the roots do not go down very far below the surface, and so when tempted by what the world has to offer, this person's "faith" disappears and he falls away and back into the world.

The thorny ground depicts one who seems to receive the Word but whose heart is rather more fond of other things that take up his time and attention and so he is lured away from the things of God. His faith is choked, and he also becomes worldly and useless for God's purposes, whom Jesus describes, as "salt that has lost its savour" (Matthew 5:13). The good ground portrays the one who hears, understand and receives the Word of God gladly. In this ground the word penetrates the heart, flourishes and grows to fruition. The person represented by the "good ground" is the only one of the four who is truly saved, and produces good fruit (Matthew 7:20). The person who receives the word in this way, in turn, goes on to become a Sower, himself, and thus spreads the good news of the gospel, far and wide and so continues the perpetual process of advancing the gospel message by sowing the seed.

This parable is also recorded in Mark 4:1-20 and Matthew 13:1-8 and the question implied in all of them, but not expressed, is: "Which ground are you?" It is a question that that everyone should ask themselves, as the answer has eternal consequences.
