2023/087 Declarations of Interest

Cllr Morley declared a pecuniary interest in Agenda item 6.1 Planning. Cllr Turner declared a pecuniary interest in Agenda Item 7.2 Payments.

2023/088 Minutes of the Last Parish Council Meeting

It was proposed by Cllr Knight and seconded by Cllr Brinkley that the minutes of the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting, held on 27 July 2023, be signed as a true record. The proposal was carried.

2023/088 Outstanding Actions:

2021/189: BMSDC Public Realm Land: Cllr Golding reported that work was being undertaken to realign the fence at the junction of Dukes Meadow.

2021/194: Local Needs Housing: SCC have still not progressed the Parish Council's application for 'Granting of a new right of common and application for registration of a right in the commons register'. The Clerk was asked to chase SCC every two weeks for an update.

2022/178: Pavilion Balustrade: The Clerk has received a verbal quotation from one Contractor for a new handrail but is awaiting the formal estimate and design. A second quotation had been received and a third Contractor will provide a design and quotation before the September PC Meeting.

2022/184.1: Reduced Speed Limits: SC Cllr Robert Lindsay has received a negative response from SCC Highways regarding the possibility of a lower speed limit on the A1141 between The Abbey and the Windmill. The Clerk to prepare the Parish Council's argument before the September meeting for submission to SC Cllrs Robert Lindsay and Paul West, Cabinet Member for Highways, seeking a meeting on site to discuss proposals.

2023/007.1: Parish Council Investments: SALC have confirmed that the PC would not be liable to pay any tax on investment interest. Cllr Levett to investigate PC bank savings account options for PC reserves.

2023/011.9: Other Assets: The Clerk confirmed he had reported on the SCC website,



that SCC had failed to undertake verge cutting in Windsor Green in accordance with their cutting schedule for C & U Roads.

Your support for this venture is vital and the team will always be happy to see you in the shop but please be patient with those of us who are learning!



October's Meeting



In September a few members, representing Cockfield WI, attended the annual High Suffolk Group Meeting, which was held this year in Hartest. It is an opportunity to let the group hear brief, positive highlights from each WI's past year. The Federation news and notices were given by Sue Beavan, WI Advisor. We were delightfully entertain



ed by the Homity folk duo, Ian and Michelle Wright. We were also treated to a very enjoyable and plentiful afternoon tea! (In the WI tradition of great teas!)

Our speaker for the October meeting was Alison Lambert, Occupational Health Adviser for the Godolphin Stud at Newmarket. Alison called her talk "Don't Get Caught Off Balance" and she asked us all to stand up and try to stand on one leg for one minute. Many of us were unable to do this for long but there were several fitter members who managed it!

We then all sat down to listen to Alison and watch her talk on the screen. Alison said the causes of loss of balance are reduced bone and muscle strength, ear infections, neurological disease, heart disease, alcohol, and medication.

There are three things that affect our balance which are, our eyes, inner ear and muscle bones and ligaments. There are many ways we can improve our stamina and strength including, weightlifting, gardening, jogging, walking, dancing and skipping. The more muscle we use the better for our health. Alison recommends we walk for 30 minutes each day. For flexibility Alison says yoga, Pilates, Tai Chi and stretching exercises are all beneficial. Alison suggests several ways we could exercise at home:

- Stand on one foot while brushing our teeth every day.
- Rise from the armchair without using your arms.
- Walking backwards.
- Stand up while the adverts are on TV.

• Stand or walk while on the telephone.

Alison explained that osteoporosis can occur in older people as our bones become less dense. She suggests people should look after their bones from the age of 30. HRT can help, as can a good diet of soyabased products and foods which are high in calcium. Milk, yoghurts, green vegetables, oily fish and oranges are all a good source of Vitamin C.

It is recommended that a vitamin supplement of Vitamin D is taken from September to April as sunlight provides the necessary vitamin in the summer months.



Brazil nuts are rich in selenium and almonds and walnuts are a good source of vitamins. Alison answered members' questions and Stevie Watts gave the vote of thanks. The report for this meeting is by Suzanne Veal.

In November we will be visited by Amanda Bloomfield, who will talk about The Gatehouse. This charity has a Home Store and a very valuable Foodbank. They organise Community Wellbeing support and also have a thriving Christmas project. The charity would not be able to deliver their services without support and donations. A popular outing in November will be a lunch at Suffolk College.

In December we are looking forward to a speaker, Lindsey Barrel, also known as Ms Cherry Bombe, with a talk entitled 'Burlesque, Me and the WI'. Other groups report that this is an excellent talk. Lindsey has been a regular speaker on the WI circuit since 2014. She is a Burlesque and Mindfulness teacher as well as a WI member and is understood to be a gifted storyteller!

The coffee morning we hold in the village hall each month is a great place to meet and have a chat!



It is open to everyone and everyone is very welcome to share some lovely homemade cakes and biscuits, as well as tea and coffee. The next coffee morning is from 10.30 am until 12 noon on Thursday ay 23rd November, in the Village Hall Committee room. The monthly coffee mornings will then return and continue from January 2024 after a short break in December!

It is hoped that our monthly Saturday lunches, after a break in the summer will now return in December and if it is confirmed, the date will be advertised around the village and in Green Links. Tips & Recipes for Autumn Pumpkins

Autumn is really here now, it gets dark much earlier and can be chilly but it is also a beautiful time of year!

'Golden, crisp leaves falling softly from almost bare trees,

Lifting and falling in a hushed gentle breeze.

Slowly dropping to the soft cushioned ground.

Whispering and rustling a soothing sound.

(Extract from 'Autumn Leaves' by Edel T Copeland)

If you have some pumpkins and perhaps have used them for Halloween celebrations, the flesh can be used in recipes. The season is from October to December and they are not only perfect for carving, they are also good for you too! They are an excellent source of fibre, vitamins and minerals! Other squashes are available during this season and they all keep very well. Butternut squashes, for instance, are delicious and versatile, especially in vegetarian dishes, both sweet and savoury.

Pumpkin Pie (choose small sweet pumpkins)

Ingredients For the pastry use readymade or make your own sweet short crust with 40g crushed pecan nuts mixed in). Filling 450g pumpkin flesh, peeled and cut into 1 inch squares 2 large eggs, plus 1 yolk (use the white for another dish) 75g dark brown sugar 1 tsp ground cinnamon $\frac{1}{2}$ level tsp freshly grated nutmeg $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp allspice $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground cloves 1/2 tsp ground ginger 275ml double cream Method Preheat the oven to 200C/Gas 6 Use a pie plate which is 23cm/9inches in diameter and bake blind for 20 minutes.

To make the filling, place the chunks on a baking tray, cover with foil and roast until tender. (Takes about 20-30 minutes), depending on your pumpkin. Press the cooked pumpkin in a coarse sieve to extract any excess water. Set aside to cool before blending in a food processor or mashing by hand to a puree. Lightly whisk the eggs and extra yolk together in a large bowl.

Put the sugar, spices and cream in a pan, bring to simmering point, giving it a whisk to mix everything together. Then pour it over the eggs and whisk again briefly. Now add the pumpkin puree, still whisking to combine everything thoroughly.

Reduce the oven temperature to 180C/Gas 4. Pour the filling into the pastry case and bake for 35-40 minutes, by which time it will puff up round the edges but still feel slightly wobbly at the centre.

Remove the pie from the oven and place on a wire cooling tray. Serve warm or chilled (store loosely covered in foil in the fridge). Serve with chilled creme fresh or cream.

Pumpkin Soup

<u>Ingredients</u>

1 large onion, chopped

- 2 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 2 garlic cloves

1 bay leaf

25g unsalted butter

2 tbsp olive oil

1 medium pumpkin (prepared weight about 850g – deseeded and roughly chopped

1 medium sized floury potato, roughly chopped

1 litre vegetable or chicken stock, a little extra may be needed

100ml double cream

3 tbsp pumpkin seeds

<u>Method</u>

Put the onion, carrots, garlic, bay leaf, butter and half the olive oil in a large pan. Cook over a low-medium heat for about 10 minutes until the vegetables are tender but not coloured.

Add the squash/pumpkin and the potato, mix to combine and cook for a further 2-3 minutes. Pour in the stock, season well and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a gentle

simmer, half cover the pan with a lid and continue to cook for about 40 minutes until the squash is really tender. Test with a knife.

Pick out the bay leaf and blend the soup with a stick blender until it is smooth. Add the cream and a little more stock if the soup is a little thick. Check the seasoning is OK.

Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil in a frying pan over a medium heat and add the pumpkin seeds frying quickly until the seeds start to pop. Remove from the pan.

Serve with the pumpkin seeds and a swirl of cream.

Recipe Tips

The flavour and sweetness of pumpkins varies considerably. Check the variety and you will find large pumpkins contain more water and less flavour than smaller varieties.

If you use a small butternut squash for instance reduce the simmering time to 15 minutes. Just check the potato is cooked through.

Halloween Pumpkin Cake

Ingredients (for the cake) 300g self-raising flour 300g light muscovado sugar 3 tsp mixed spice 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 175a sultanas $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt 4 eggs, beaten 200a melted butter Zest of 1 orange 1 tbsp orange juice 500g (prepared) butternut squash or pumpkin flesh, grated (for drenching and frosting) 200g soft cheese 85g softened butter 100g icing sugar, sifted Zest 1 orange and juice of half

Method

Heat the oven to 180C/Fan 160C/Gas 4. Butter and line a 30cm x 20cm baking or small roasting tin with baking parchment. Put the flour, sugar, spice, bicarb, sultanas and salt into a large bowl. Stir to combine.

Beat the eggs into the melted butter, stir in the orange zest and juice. Then mix with the dry ingredients until combined. Stir in the pumpkin. Pour the batter into the tin and bake for 30 minutes or until golden and springy to the touch. To make the frosting, beat together the cheese, butter, icing sugar, orange zest and 1 tsp of the juice until smooth and creamy. Then set aside in the fridge. When the cake is cooked, allow to cool for 5 minutes and turn it out on a wire tray. Prick it all over with a skewer and drizzle all over with the rest of the orange juice while still warm. Leave to cool.

Beat the frosting to loosen. Then using a palette knife, spread over the top of the cake. If you need the cake later, then return to the fridge. Remove 30 minutes before serving.

Will keep 3 days in the fridge, if covered.





Cockfield and the Eastern Command Stop Line - Part 1

After I'd been in Cockfield for a few months I started seeing them everywhere. I would be out for a run and would see one, squat and ugly, often right by the side of the road, as in the case of the one on the approach into Cross Green, or the one seemingly guarding the entrance to Old Hall Lane, as if daring the unauthorised to seek entry - sinister looking bunkers with embrasures for machine guns and other heavy weapons. I couldn't help noticing one as I was driving down to Lavenham. I'd never lived in an area with so many of these so-called pillboxes and my old infantry training started to kick in. Why were they sited here? What were their arcs of fire? Where was the dead ground and possible enemy covered approaches? Were they mutually supporting? And most important of all for an infantryman, was there a covered exit?

I started to do a bit of reading and I started to piece it together. First of all a bit of background is required. During World War Two, construction of pillboxes and other fortifications began after the Fall of France in June 1940, when the threat of invasion was very real. Basically there were two systems of defence that were put forward. The first was the 'nodal point' system. These were towns where effective defensive positions could be created using existing buildings. Fighting in built up areas is a military nightmare and best avoided, but key towns controlling road junctions are fiercely fought over. One only has to think of Gettysburg in Pennsylvania where seven roads converge like spokes on a wheel, or Bastogne in Belgium. Mildenhall, Bury St Edmunds, Lavenham, Long Melford, Sudbury and Bures were nodal points. Further to the east there was Thetford, Ixworth, Stowmarket, Needham Market, Claydon and Ipswich.



The second form of defence proposed were 'stop lines'. These were a series of heavily defended strongpoints using natural features such as rivers and canals, augmented by man made structures such as railway embankments and cuttings, anti tank ditches and other obstacles, barbed wire entanglements and of course the ubiquitous pillbox. These stop lines would channel the enemy columns into 'killing zones'. Well that was the theory.



Stop lines were designed to slow the advance of German armoured columns, setting them up for a counter attack by mobile defensive forces. The stop lines would effectively become one long anti-tank obstacle, natural wherever possible, covered by pillboxes and other prepared positions. On 25th June 1940, General Paget, Chief of Staff to the Commander in Chief Home Forces, submitted General Ironside's anti-invasion plan to the War Cabinet in the form of Home Forces Operation Instruction No 3. This stated that "the general plan of defence is for a combination of mobile columns and static defences by means of strong (nodal) points and stop lines...This system of stop lines and strong points will prevent the enemy from running riot and tearing the guts out of the country, as happened in Belgium and France". The pillboxes in and around Cockfield and Bury St Edmunds formed part of the Eastern Command Line, also known as the Corps Line. The map shows the major Stop Lines in Suffolk, and the photograph shows the pillbox in Old Hall Lane, which is a Type 22 pillbox. Next time I'll have a look at the design and construction of these fortifications and point out some of the more visible ones in the local area. JG

Dear Friends,

November is a time of remembering. On 5 November we remember the (failed) gunpowder plot when in 1605 a group of English Catholics sought to restore the Catholic monarchy to England after decades of persecution against Catholics.

It is quite hard for us to think about England being divided due to religion. There had been decades of religious tension in England by the time the gunpowder plot was discovered. English Catholics struggled in a society dominated by the newly separate protestant Church of England. It was Queen Elizabeth I, the daughter of Henry VIII who responded to the growing religious divide by introducing the Elizabethan Religious Settlement, which required anyone appointed to a public or church office to swear allegiance to the monarch as head of the Church and state. The penalties for refusal were severe; but Catholic priests continued to practice their faith in secret.

To this day, priests in the Church of England swear an oath of allegiance to the monarch when they ordained and again when they are made Rector or Vicar of a parish or group of parishes. We no longer persecute people in our country under the law for the religion that they follow, and I thank God for that.

Unfortunately, there are many places in our world where religious differences cause a huge amount of tension, and sometimes can lead to violence. We are seeing this in many places now, not least in Palestine.

I pray, along with many others in the Church to which I belong, for peace. For conflict caused by religious and cultural differences to cease. It feels at times that this will never be achieved, but that does not mean that we can't still pray and hope for it. And as another date for remembering occurs in November, that of Remembrance Day, I pray that we shall remember those from our own land who have fought for peace and democracy. May we continue to work for peace as they so bravely fought for it.

Advice Column

Halloween is coming up and my children are keen to dress up for trick-ortreat. I've read about accidents involving costumes catching fire and I'm worried about buying an outfit that could be highly flammable. I don't want to spoil their fun, but I do want to make sure everyone is safe. How can I check if the costumes would be safe for my children to wear?

It's not easy being the 'safety police' when everyone just wants to have fun especially when that fun includes extravagant costumes. Children should always be kept away from naked flames, but Halloween costumes come with their own set of risks for which extra safety precautions are needed. They're not always subject to the same fire safety checks as normal clothing as they can often be classed as toys. With Halloween being a time where lots of lit candles in pumpkins are on the same doorsteps that trick-or-treaters congregate on. As you rightly point out there have sadly been accidents associated with dressing-up outfits and so checking the garment complies with UK/EU safety standards should be a top priority.

No one wants an unexpected horror story at Halloween so it's always best to know what you're looking for when buying any costume to make sure the risks are limited as much as they can be:

• Always buy your Halloween costumes from reputable shops and online retailers. If you haven't bought anything from the shop before, make sure you check online reviews.

• Make sure the costume comes with safety instructions, a UKCA or CE marking and the manufacturer's name. The UKCA marking is the post-Brexit British equivalent of the CE mark which is also still valid.

• Check for any product recalls online — searching for 'product safety recalls' will bring up the Office for Product Safety and Standards list.

While you might like to let your creative streak run wild and attempt to make your own bespoke costume, it's worth keeping in mind that homemade fancy dress costumes may also come with risks, especially if you use fabrics or decorations not designed to be worn.

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

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Congregational Church Corner

Someone has written: "It is good to do the work of God but it is far better to do the will of God". This profound and true statement came back to me as I was reading through 1 Chronicles 28 recently, which exactly illustrates the point the writer was making.

David wanted to build a temple to house the arc of the covenant which was, effectively, the dwelling place of God on earth (verse 2). He had the blueprint for the building, given to him by God Himself (verse 19) and all of the resources necessary for completion of the project to a magnificent standard (verses 14 - 18). The idea to build the temple was affirmed by God, Himself (verse 10), this being within His plan and purpose for His people, providing a suitable place for them to worship Him. Unfortunately for David, however, God told him that he was not to be one to build it (verse 6).

God did not do this out of malice or to punish David in any way, but because the temple was to be a house of prayer and peace, it was inappropriate for a man of war, who had shed blood, like David who was a warrior king, to build such a place (verse 3).

This must have devastated David, because it had long been his heart's desire to build a temple to the glory of God, but this was being taken away from him and given to his son Solomon (verse 20), which David just accepted. He did not rant and rave at God over His decision but, instead, he praised Him for it (1 Chronicles 29: 10).

David had many faults and failings, but in this, he serves as an example to us all. It is not our will that matters but God's. And so David was accorded the privilege of being called "a man after God's own heart" (1 Samuel 13:14) and, additionally, he was greatly blessed by God (1 Chronicles 14:2).

To contest the will of God in anything is futile, because, as we are told: "unless the Lord builds the house the labourer labours in vain" (Psalm 127: 1). This is so true, and it is, therefore, far better to yield to God's will in all that we do, rather than spend time and effort on something God will not bless because He is not in it. If we learn this lesson early in life then we will do well in God' service and, like David, receive God's blessing.

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
