For some months now I have been unwell and it has become a bit of a mission to get safely into and out of the bath, so my wife and I have worked out a routine; I have my bath - with her lurking discretely in the room for my safety - and, when I am done, I put my head above the rim of the bath where it is promptly and vigorously attacked by a pair of hands holding a large towel before another towel is draped around me.

The first time we did this I was transported back 65 years to a little cottage in Shimpling called Thorne Lodge. - there was no central heating whenre we lived there and the bathroom was as cold as winter!

I would bath with my younger brother, (I was 5 and he was 3) and as soon as we were done our heads would pop up over the rim of the bath and Mum would start drying us with a large towel. So vigorous was the drying process that our teeth would rattle. As soon as my brother's hair was dried my mum would swaddle him in an enormous bath towel, hoist him over her shoulder in a fireman's lift and carry him downstairs where my Dad would be waiting by the fire to finish drying him whilst Mum came back for me.

Our Jim Jams would be airing and warming on a clothes horse by the fire and as soon as we were warm, dry and hair brushed it would be time to climb the wooden hill to Bedfordshire, whilst being gently soothed by a lullaby

2023/124 Minutes of the Last Parish Council Meeting It was proposed by Cllr Knight and seconded by Cllr Fletcher that the minutes of the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting, held on 28 September 2023, be signed as a true record. The proposal was carried.



Suffolk Residents invited to help shape the future of library services

Suffolk County Council has launched a public consultation encouraging Suffolk Residents to tell Suffolk County Council what they want from their library services in the future. Suffolk County Council's contract with Suffolk's Libraries, the independent charity that runs the library service, comes to an end on 31 May 2025, with a new contract set to begin in June 2025. The Council is therefore seeking views from the public about what is important to them, ahead of awarding the new contract.

To inform the consultation, the council has undertaken engagement with over 30 organisations including Suffolk Libraries staff, key service users, schools and partner organisations. A key focus of the consultation is the council's Library outreach services, which include three mobile library vehicles, for the pickup and exchange of books. The mobile library vehicles are coming to the end of their life and the council therefore needs to consider the best way to deliver these services to people in rural areas of the county going forward. Library Outreach services also include Pop-up Libraries and a home library service, run by local volunteers, is also available for Suffolk residents that find it difficult to access a static or mobile library.

The consultation is made up of two parts. Part one gives residents an opportunity to tell the council what they value in their library service and what they would like to see more of in the future. Part two seeks views on how Library Outreach services could be run in the future.

The council is keen to hear from people who currently use library services and those who do not, to better understand the needs across the county. This feedback will help to inform the requirements for the future contract.

Tips & Recipes for Winter Vegetables

At this time of the year, especially after Christmas, it may be a good idea to use more seasonal vegetables. If you grow your own it is probably better to keep them in the ground for a while but if you buy vegetables, most keep well in the fridge or can be frozen.

If you store vegetables in the fridge, then spinach, sprouts, broccoli, asparagus etc. keep for 3-5 days. You can keep potatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, cauliflowers etc. for 1 week.

Red and green peppers, green onions, celery and parsnips can be kept a little longer.

Make sure the vegetables are dry and keep different varieties separately in air tight containers or bags. Generally keep anything green in the fridge!

Roasted Winter Vegetables

(Other veg. can be added or substitutes used). This is an interesting side dish for a special meal.

Ingredients

1 large sweet potato (about 1/2lb. peeled and cubed)
2 cups Brussel sprouts trimmed and halved
1/2lb. small potatoes (any colour) halved
½ lb green beans trimmed
1 medium apple, diced or sliced
1 shallot sliced
2 tbsp. dried cranberries
1 oz candied or roasted pecans
Olive oil - to drizzle
Seasoning to taste, which could include herbs, a little balsamic vinegar, garlic etc.
Method
Preheat oven to 200 fan

Combine sweet potatoes, sprouts, green beans, apple and shallots in a large

bowl or sealable bag. Drizzle with olive oil and toss or mix to coat. Season.

Line a baking sheet with aluminium foil. Spread the vegetables in a single layer on the sheet or use 2 sheets if needed.

Bake until vegetables are tender enough to pierce with a fork and have some tasty charred bits on the edges. Approx. 25-35 mins. Use a spatula to flip vegetables mid-way through cooking.

Transfer to serving dish and top with pecans and cranberries.

This dish can be prepared and cooked the day before needed and reheated in the oven for about 10 minutes.

Winter Vegetable Soup

A flexible winter soup with optional chorizo. Use any fresh winter root veg. and cabbage that you have.

Ingredients

2 tbsp sunflower oil

- 1 onion, finely sliced,
- 3 garlic cloves, finely sliced
- 2 carrots, cut into 1.5 cm chunks
- 2 turnips, cut into 1.5cm chunks

1 large potato cut into 1.5 cm chunks (Maris Piper preferably)

1 large parsnip, cut into 1.5 cm chunks

- 2 heaped tsp sweet paprika, plus extra to serve
- 1 heaped tsp hot smoked paprika
- 1 x 400g tinned tomatoes

1 tbsp tomato puree

125g chorizo sausage (optional & preferably picante), skinned & cut into 5 mm slices

100g Puy lentils, rinsed & drained

1.75 litres stock, chicken or vegetable

100g cavolo nero, kale or spring greens with tough ribs removed & shredded Flaked sea salt & freshly ground black pepper

Soured cream or crème fraiche, to taste

Method

Heat the oil in a large non-stick saucepan or large flame proofed casserole. Fry the onion and garlic gently for 5 minutes, or until softened but not coloured, stirring occasionally. While the onion is frying, cut the carrots, turnips, potatoes and parsnips into roughly 1.5cm chunks.

Add the root vegetables to the pan with the onion and garlic and cook over a low heat for 5 mins, or until beginning to soften, stirring occasionally. Stir in both the sweet and smoked paprika and fry for a few minutes.

Add the tomatoes and the tomato puree to the pan, increasing the heat a little and cook for 2-3 minute, stirring regularly.

Add the chorizo, Puy lentils and the stock into the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer gently for 45 minutes, or until the vegetables and lentils re tender, stirring every now and then. Stir regularly. Season the soup with salt and lots of freshly ground black pepper. Serve in deep bowls with a dollop of soured cream or crème fraiche and a sprinkling of paprika.

Winter Vegetable Soup with Butternut Squash & Cauliflower

Ingredients

2 tsp olive oil 1 medium onion, chopped 3 cloves garlic, minced 2 medium carrots. cut into thin half circles 2 medium celery stalks, thinly sliced ¼ tsp dried thyme $\frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{8}$ tsp dried chilli flakes ½ tsp salt 1 ½ tbsp tomato puree 1 ¼ lb butternut squash – about 4 cups ³/₄ lb cauliflower – about 3 cups 3 cups vegetable stock/broth 1½ cups water 2 bay leaves ¼ cup parsley, finely chopped Salt & pepper to taste

Method

Heat the olive oil in a large saucepan set on a medium heat.

Add the onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onion starts to soften (about 5 minutes).

Add the garlic, carrots, celery, thyme, dried chilli flakes and salt. Stir in the tomato paste & cook until the vegetables are tender (about 5 minutes).

Stir in the butternut squash, cauliflower, stock/broth, water and bay leaves.

Bring to the boil and reduce to a simmer. Partially cover with a lid and cook until the squash and cauliflower are tender (about 15-20 minutes).

Cool for 10 minutes, then transfer 3 cups of the soup to a blender (if wanted) & transfer 3 cups of the soup to a blender. Puree until almost smooth & stir the mixture back into the soup.



Four notable Suffolk graves

Four notable Suffolk warriors - Part 2: Reg Seekings

Some readers may have watched the BBC series called SAS Rogue Heroes. Now I have to admit that I have been for some considerable time reasonably well acquainted with the post war history of the modern 22nd Special Air Service Regiment and some of it's more celebrated achievements, for example the Battle of Mirbat in 1972, the storming of the Iranian Embassy in 1980, and the Pebble Island raid during the Falklands War of 1982. However, I'd never got around to reading a definitive account about their origins in World War 2 until I picked up Ben McIntyre's book, on which the television series was based. I actually watched the television series first, which sucked me in with its heavy rock soundtrack! The series focused on their beginnings in the desert wastelands of North Africa and focused on six of the founding members. First there was the man behind it all, David Stirling. He was a mass of contradictions. Well connected (which he used to good effect), charming, physically unimpressive, shy, modest, but blessed with enormous self confidence, determination and vision. Then there was Stirling's deputy, the fearsome Ulsterman Blair 'Paddy' Mayne, a man who could inspire and terrify in equal measure, and I'm talking here among his own comrades! The bravest man never to be awarded the Victoria Cross, according to many who knew him. The last officer the show focused on was John 'Jock' Lewis, who more than anyone shaped the emerging SAS into what set them apart. He was austere and entirely lacking in humour but possessed an iron will and believed in hard work and self discipline. All he needed to sustain him for a day's operations in the desert was a cup of the tea in the morning. The series also had as main characters three SAS troopers who were among the

first to be recruited by Stirling and Lewis into the SAS, and one of these was the indomitable Reg Seekings.

Now I have to say that Reg Seekings was not a man blessed with particularly attractive personal characteristics, as we will see, but first a bit about his background. He was born the son of a farm labourer in 1920 in Stuntney near Ely, and grew up in the tied cottage that went with his father's work, along with his younger brother. He took up boxing despite being blind in one eye, and at 18 he joined his local territorial battalion of the Cambridgeshire Regiment and boxed for his Regiment in bouts all over East Anglia. After war broke out he volunteered for and was accepted by 7 Commando Regiment, part of what was known as 'Layforce' and took part in operations with this unit before they were disbanded. When Seekings found out about the nascent 'L Detachment' SAS Brigade (it wasn't a Brigade at all, this was simply deception) he was keen to join.



On the face of it, Seekings wasn't a man who fit the criteria that Stirling was looking for in recruits to his fledgling outfit. Stirling wanted men who, other than being exceptionally fit and singularly determined, were intelligent, independent-minded but also disciplined, brave but just short of reckless, and merciless without being psychopathic. Seekings was a ruffian through and through, a proper hard man, full of snarling aggression. He was quite prepared to challenge anyone who disagreed with him with his fists and often did. He was disdainful of anyone who backed down (as many understandably did, given his 14 stone muscular frame and ferocious right hook). He later took this attitude into battle, and once someone measured up in his eyes he would be utterly loyal, but equally dismissive of those who didn't. In his own words he was a rough, tough so and so.

It seems that Stirling was prepared to overlook Seekings wild man antics and lack of self control because Seekings was seemingly totally fearless and was prepared to do things that others wouldn't, or couldn't do. He was utterly ruthless and never took a backward step. He certainly had no compunction about killing. This is summed up by what he says about a particular episode during the invasion of Sicily in July 1943 during which he stormed a pillbox housing a machine gun by hurling in a grenade and shooting the Italian occupants as they staggered out one by one with his revolver. In Ben McIntyre's book he says this: "To a certain extent I enjoyed it, but it's not everyone's cup of tea. I was scared, but I would have gone into action every day if I could". What can you say to that? Not the sort of man you'd want to run into in peace time, but just the sort of

man you'd want alongside you when the fighting kicked off!

Seekings saw action with 1st SAS Regiment in North Africa, Northwest Europe and Norway, and with the Special Raiding Squadron in Italy. He rose to the rank of WO2 and in this rank held the appointment of Squadron Sergeant Major. His wartime exploits are the stuff of legend. In one notable incident in Termoli on the east coast of Italy Seekings was fastening the tailgate



of a truck loaded with 17 SAS men when it was hit by a 105mm artillery shell killing everyone on board. Miraculously Seekings escaped the carnage with just a broken fingernail. During an action in the Morvan region of France near Dijon Seekings was caught by a burst of machine gun fire at close range which, if that wasn't bad enough, was followed up by two hand grenades which landed either side of him, seriously wounding his left arm. After a fighting withdrawal of three miles with the rest of his unit, during which Seekings had to run, his wounds were finally treated on a table in wood with a tarpaulin stretched overhead to keep out the rain. A doctor from the local Maquis discovered that there was a bullet lodged in the back of his neck, nestling against his spine. After digging around for a bit the doctor (who turned out to be a dentist), decided to leave the bullet in place rather than risk doing more damage. Seekings was patched up and made a full recovery and was soon back in action. The bullet was finally removed some months later in a British hospital, leaving no permanent damage. Like I said, a proper hard man. During the last days of the war Seekings and his old friend and comrade in arms Johnny Cooper, another SAS 'original' from the earliest days, were some of the first to enter Belsen Concentration Camp, where 70,000 people were killed. What it must have been like to confront that horror I simply cannot imagine.



The wartime SAS was disbanded in September 1945 and on demobilisation Seekings and his wife Monica ran the Rifleman Arms pub in Ely for nine years (It's long gone and it's unclear where it was. Some accounts say it was on Lynne Road, other accounts say it stood on the corner of Broad Street and Back Hill. Perhaps a reader can clear this up for me). They then went to Northern Rhodesia where they bought a tobacco farm, and during the Bush War of the 1960s and 1970s he became an Inspector in the anti-terrorist police. By the end of the 1970s the political landscape had changed and Rhodesia was about to become Zimbabwe.

The couple returned to East Anglia and settled in Stanton in Suffolk. Reg Seekings was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal in 1942 and the Military Medal in 1943. He died on 17 March 1999 and is buried in St John the Baptist's Church, Stanton.

Special Storage Site' at RAF Barnham - Part 1

Readers of Green Links will I'm sure by now be aware of my interest in local military history. I have covered the 'Friendly Invasion' of the US Air Army Forces in Suffolk in earlier editions, and have also written an article about the US Thor nuclear missiles that were based at RAF stations Tuddenham and Shepherd's Grove in Suffolk in the late 1950s in the early stages of the Cold War.

I only recently became aware of a 'hidden gem' lurking in the Suffolk countryside on the edge of the Brecklands near Thetford. Readers who regularly travel up the A134 from Bury towards Thetford are no doubt aware of the small RAF facility called RAF Barnham, some two miles south of Thetford. The camp is a satellite of nearby RAF Honington and has a training area which is used by the RAF Regiment. The training area is also used by local Cadet units. In fact I was on there with RAF cadets in October 2021. It is thought that the site will be disposed of by the MoD by 2027.

The site at Barnham has existed since World War 1 when it was used to test tanks, and during World War 2 it was used as a bomb storage site to service the numerous Bomber Command airfields that were dispersed in the East Anglian countryside. The photographs show the site then and now. Apparently mustard gas was stored there, as well as conventional high explosive and incendiary ordnance. A railway line linked Thetford and Bury St Edmunds back then (those were the days!) and there was even a station at Barnham on - you guessed it - Station Road. This had sidings which linked to the bomb storage areas. After the war the site was wound down and the munitions were disposed of (many were dumped at sea). The photograph shows the site in its WW2 days, along with a wider view of the same area taken a few years ago.



The arrival of the nuclear era was when things got interesting at RAF Barnham. Britain had developed its first nuclear bomb in the early 1950s and sites were needed to store it. This bomb was known as Blue Danube (sounds more like a Prog Rock band), and was little more than a scientific experiment crammed into a ten ton, 24 foot long casing to

make it streamlined. It was a free fall, unguided plutonium fission bomb with a yield of between 10 and 12 kilotons, and was to be dropped by the RAF's nascent force of V bombers that were entering service in the mid 1950s. These were the Vickers Valiant,

the Avro Vulcan and the Handley Page Victor, which entered service with the RAF in that order. There are examples of a Vulcan and a Victor at IWM Duxford, but sadly no Valiant. The only museum in the world where you can see all three V bombers under the same roof is the excellent RAF Museum at Cosford. But I digress! By way of comparison, the Thor missiles mentioned earlier had a warhead of 1.44 megatons, which made the Blue Danube look like something of a firecracker. A Blue Danube was first dropped during a test by an **RAF** Vickers Valiant in October 1956. This event is shown in the photograph, along with a picture of a Blue Danube bomb with a white coated scientist technician attending to its (frequent) needs.



Two sites were developed to store the new 'special weapon' - if I am to use the euphemism of the day. The northern site was at RAF Faldingworth near Lincoln, and this site would service the V Bombers based at Scampton, Waddington, Coningsby, Finningly and Cottesmore. The other was the one at RAF Barnham, which would store the Blue

Danube bombs for onward transport to the bases at Honington, Marham, Wittering and Wyton. Declassified files record the storage site opening in June 1954, as part of 94 Maintenance Sub Unit at RAF Barnham. When it opened it would have looked as it does in the photograph. As we will see in the next edition the site had a relatively short life, being decommissioned in 1963.

In the next edition I'll look at the actual site in more detail, and I'll



talk about my recent visit there when I had a good look around. I will also mention its future as an English Heritage site. This is very exciting news indeed as the site is an important part of Suffolk's Cold War past.

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




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Dear Reader,

Happy New Year to you! I hope you enjoyed the festivities of Christmas and New Year. As I write, we are still over 2 weeks from Christmas Day, but by the time you are reading this, after all the celebrations of Christmas, we are now faced with the first months of a new year, when resolutions have perhaps already been broken, when we are counting the cost of our Christmas celebrations, and when there doesn't seem to be much to look forward to in the next few weeks. However, we have some feasts to look forward to in the Church's calendar.

We celebrate Epiphany on the first Sunday of January, the visit of the wise men to see Jesus. We also celebrate the Baptism of Jesus during the Epiphany Season and marking what is commonly known as 'Candlemas' on 28th January, which is when Mary and Joseph took the baby Jesus to the temple at Jerusalem to be presented to God (part of the Jewish tradition). The Gospel of St Luke says that Jesus was met by Anna and Simeon. Anna and Simeon were two older people who spent most of their time in and around the temple in Jerusalem. They recognised Jesus as the Messiah, Simeon held him and called him 'a Light to the World'. The festival is known as 'Candlemas' because this was the day that all the Church's candles for the year were blessed. On Candlemas night, many people placed lighted candles in their windows at home.

So, we have festivals throughout Epiphany tide to keep us going until we feel that the worst of the winter months are over. Although Christmas Day has come and gone – there is still the joy of the incarnation, when God became flesh, to experience everything that we experience as human beings. But we know the end of the story, that Jesus grew up, and suffered for us on a cross. Not just for the Jews, but for everyone – regardless of status, creed, culture or colour.

This is great news! I hope that you will come and experience for yourselves some of the festivals of Epiphany tide – and feel the love of Christ, who came to live his life among us, and still lives with us today.

December Advice Column: Winter Fuel Bills

I am a single parent with two kids, and I'm really worried about how I'll afford to pay my energy bills when I have to start putting the heating and lights on more now winter is here. At the moment I just about have enough money to cover my bills but there is nothing left over. The thought of getting into debt keeps me awake at night but the idea of my children being cold and possibly unwell as a result is just unbearable. What can I do?

You are not alone - a record number of people came to Citizens Advice with energy debt in the first four months of 2023 (32,400) - a 112% increase on the same period in 2020 (15,200). There are things you can do to feel in control when it comes to your energy bills. There are some simple tips to help save money on your energy bills. They won't cover all the extra costs, but they can make a difference:

• Check your thermostat: A room temperature between 18°C and 21° C is ideal for most people. Try turning your thermostat down by one degree within this range – it could save you around £115 a year. If a medical condition means you need a warmer home, ask your GP what room temperature you should aim for.

• Keep the heat in: Check your home for any gaps in the doors, windows and floors. Blocking any holes where you could get a draught could save you around £30 a year. It is important to allow for some ventilation as without it mould and damp can form.

• Turn off anything you're not using: Turning your appliances, like TVs and washing machines, off instead of leaving them on standby could save around £60 a year. Turning off lights when you're not using them – even if it's just off for a few seconds - could save around £25 a year.

• Consider using LED lightbulbs, which cost less to run.

• Watch your water usage: Cutting your shower time by just one minute can make a difference. If everyone in a four-person household with a water meter did this, they could save around £75 a year. If you're struggling to afford your energy bills, you might be able to get support from the government or your energy supplier. The first step is to contact your supplier to find out what they can offer. You may be eligible for benefits including the Warm Home Discount, Cold Weather Payments or the Household Support Fund, find out more about these on our website. 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

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
