

Dear Friends

I'm writing this as we approach Easter Day and I do hope your Easter celebrations were joyful and filled with the love of families and friends. Over the next few weeks in our services we will be hearing from the book of the Acts of the Apostles, and as we move towards Ascension Day and Pentecost, we begin to grapple with the consequences of Jesus' death and resurrection, both for the early church, and for our own church.

For me, what is so wonderful about the Acts of the Apostles is at the beginning of the book, the Christian faith appeared to be just another Jewish sect, but by the end it was well on the way to being an international faith that could speak to the whole world. One of the important aspects of this was the fact that non-Jews were being admitted to the church, and they were not having to become Jews first. And then enter Paul, with <u>the</u> conversion story of all time.

And throughout Acts the activity of the Holy Spirit is so prevalent. Paul and his companion Barnabus were sent out by the Holy Spirit to preach in what is now Turkey. It was the start of a journey to the ends of the

earth. And each breakthrough in the church's mission came through the continual outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit guided the early church, it led Peter to Cornelius, it prompted Saul on his first journey, and it sent Paul into Europe and ordered Paul to Jerusalem.

At the end of Acts (following an exciting storm at sea in Acts 27) we see Paul under house arrest, in Rome, awaiting trial. A rather dispiriting end you may think, but, looked at another way, it ends with the Good News being preached on the streets of Rome, the heart of the empire. And this was only the beginning....

Acts inspires us to recapture the enthusiasm of those early Christians, many suffering and even dying for their faith. We are not tested to this extreme, but there are those in our world who are. There are areas in the world, such as in North Korea and Nigeria, where Christians are not free to express their love of the Lord, and those who do are at risk of imprisonment, or even death. And yet, the persecuted church continues to praise and worship our Lord, setting an example to us all.

And so, I invite you to join us in all our services across the benefice this month, praising and thanking God for all that he has given us, breaking bread together, hearing the word of God, equipping us to continue to witness to him in our everyday lives.

This month's 'Big Green Challenge'



Atmospheric CO₂ levels are continuing to rise. In the past 50 years we have added 100ppm of CO2 to the atmosphere according to Martin Siegart, co-director of the Grantham Institute. 'It's going up about two points every year so in 100 years we'd end up at 600ppm and that would be just crazy,' he says.

The last time CO₂ levels exceeded 400ppm was around four million years ago when global temperatures were 2-4°c (3.6-7.2F) warmer and sea levels were 10-25m (33-82ft) higher than today.

In 2022 the IPCC warned that removing CO₂ from the atmosphere is essential because even big emissions' cuts won't be enough to limit global warming. Yet technologies such as carbon capture are only just emerging and are very expensive.

Planting more trees and protecting carbon-absorbing ecosystems is one of the most effective ways of scaling up carbon capture. But forests worldwide are shrinking at an alarming rate. According to new research, destruction of tropical rainforests is far outstripping the current rate of regrowth.

This is affecting how much carbon tropical forests retain. The loss of forest carbon in the tropics was twice as high in 2015-2019 as it was in 2001-2015, according to a 2022 study.

Easter MessyrChurch took place on Saturday 23 March in Felsham Village Hall (the day before


